Rangers have nothing left to play with

NEW YORK (GP) New York Ranger General Manager Phil Esposito has finally outsmarted himself... right out of a hockey team. Esopo may have dealt for the two best defensemen in hockey, but he gave up almost an entire team to get them.

The New York Rangers are now three players: Ray Bourque, Paul Coffey, and Bob Froese. Earlier yesterday, all other Rangers were traded to either Boston or Pittsburgh.

For their game against the lowly LA Kings last night, the Rangers dressed only five skaters in front of goalie Bob Froese; besides Coffey and Bourque manning the blue-line, a Ranger trainer joined ex-Rangers Kelly Kisio and Brian Muller up front.
