SPECIAL MA SCHOLARSHIPS

Applicants must be Canadian citizens (or permanent residents of Canada living in the country) at the time of application, and must be nominated for the award by a faculty member.

At the time of application nominees must:

- a) be in the final year of an Honours BA programme or its equivalent, or hold an Honours BA degree or its equivalent, and have at no time undertaken graduate studies in any field;
- b) have first-class standing in their present or previous course of studies or have other proof of exceptional merit;
- c) intend to pursue full-time graduate studies leading to a master's degree at a Canadian university.

VALUE in 1986-1987 was \$11,340.

DEADLINE - The complete application postmarked no later than December 1.

DOCTORAL FELLOWSHIPS

Applicants must be Canadian citizens or permanent residents of Canada living in the country at the time of application.

This competition is open to persons who, by the time of taking up the award, will have completed

- a) at least one year of doctoral study, or
- b) a master's degree and will be pursuing full-time studies leading to the Ph.D. or equivalent.

VALUE in 1986-1987 was \$12,000.

DEADLINE - Applicants registered full time at a Canadian university must ensure that the application and all supporting documents reach their Graduate Director on the date set by the Programme. The University must forward the complete application to the Council, postmarked no later than November 20.

Applicants not registered full time at a Canadian university must send their complete application including supporting documents to the Council, postmarked no later than November 15.
