

- Q. How would you give it?
A. As a command.
- Q. How did you give this order?
A. I addressed him by name and told him what to do. That is the way I gave the order.
- Q. You can't remember whether the accused was alone or not?
A. That's right.
- Q. What did the accused do?
A. I seen him around later. I had other work to do.
- Q. You don't know whether he went back or not?
A. I don't know whether he went back at that particular time or not.

RE-EXAMINED

- Q. The fire that was mentioned. Were you on duty in "A" Compound when the fire took place?
A. Yes, Sir.
- Q. How long did it last?
A. Not very long because it was only on top of the cell block with paliasses.
- Q. Can you say approximately how long?
A. No, Sir, I wasn't there all the time.

QUESTIONS BY THE COURT:

- Q. What is the procedure around your detention camp? Did the men have any duties to do when they were outside the hut?
A. Those that weren't detailed for duty were on the parade square training.
- Q. You say you ordered the accused to go back to his quarters? How do you know he wasn't on duty?
A. It was after parade hours and he shouldn't have been out there.
- Q. What are parade hours?
A. 1630 hours you come in.
- Q. You say you gave the order after parade hours. How do you know that?
A. Because I don't come on duty until 1630 hours.
- Q. It was after you came on duty?
A. Yes, Sir.
- Q. What time was the news given out on the 8th about VE Day?
A. Before I went on duty sir.
- Q. What time approximately?
A. I couldn't say, Sir.
- Q. What time did you hear about it?
A. We came off duty and went to bed and they told us when we got up. The inmates had been told when we went on duty.

JUDGE ADVOCATE

- Q. How far from the accused were you when you gave the order?
A. 5 or 6 feet.
- Q. Did he do anything to indicate that he had heard the order? Was he facing you?
A. Yes, Sir.
- Q. Did you give it in a loud or soft voice? *see*
