The General Assembly met in Ottawa last year under the shadow of a great sorrow. Information had just been received of the death of Dr. G. L. Mac-Kay, our pioneer missionary in Formosa, wose labors in that far distant island had been so for eful. Soon after the Assembly closed its sessions, we were startled by the tidings of the sudden death of one who had taken part in its deliberations, Dr. A. B kay, of Crescent Street church, Montreal, one foremost preachers in the country. On the day preceding that Sabbath. heroic Superintendent our Northwest missions, Dr. Robertson. who had done more than most other men to up the church, was called home. Two months later. Dr. Laing, of Dundas, the first convener of our Western Home Mission Committee, and one who had rendered signal service in many directions, was summoned to his reward; and, only the other day we paid our last tribute to the memory of Principal Grant, whose contagious optimism and magnetic personality made him so great a power in the Church and country, and
