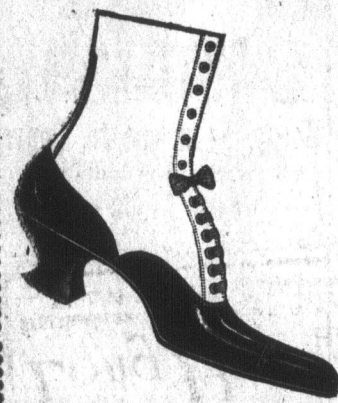

WALLACEBURG WON.

Wallaceburg 3, Chatham 2. This is the history of the lacrosse game played in Wallaceburg yesterday afternoon.

It was purely Wallaceburg's game and the Chatham team have themselves to blame for the loss. The game played well and stopped many a fine piece of combination work on the part of the Wallaceburg home. Elliott, Knight, Grant and Petherly showed up particularly strong. Feed made a good goal keeper and has a number of brilliant stops to his credit.

Every man on the Chatham home, however, was off color and put up a very loose game. Several times good opportunities to shoot were missed altogether. The ball was missed repeatedly and the passing and combination work was careless and loose. It was clearly a case of being outplayed, and the better playing team won. Loller and Tierney, of the Wallaceburg home, were the life of the game at their end of the field, while Les Appleford and Chas. Rose, of the defence, were always in the right place.

Loller, Wallaceburg's centre man, was considered the best man on the London team last year. He, however, was held down well by Higley yesterday.

One notable feature of the game was the system played by the Wallaceburg team. Their play was very pretty at all times.

Chatham had a good gang of rooters along and their excitement knew no bounds when at half time the score stood 2-0 for Chatham. In the third quarter, however, Wallaceburg scored one goal and in the fourth they notched two more.

The game was a hard one and no grandstand playing was indulged in by either side. The defeat will do the Chatham team good as they will, as a result, work all the harder for the next game.

DETROIT-CHATHAM GAME.

The Detroit Lacrosse Club promises to put in the field to-morrow, against Chatham, the strongest line-up that has ever been seen on a Detroit field. Brusso will be out again, a loss that weakens the team, but Tierney, the famous Montreal goal keeper, and the other men, who have been secured with a view to making the club the strongest in the country, will be on hand. DEATH ROLL AT HEPNER.

IT WILL REACH FIVE HUNDRED OR MORE.

Wall of Water Overwhelmed the Town—The Inhabitants Were at Dinner, and Had no Intimation of Danger.

The Dalles, Ore., June 17.—A telephone message from Ione states that the latest finds in the ruins of Heppner indicate that the loss of life will be much greater than at first supposed.

The casualty list will foot up from 350 to 500, and many of the bodies will never be recovered.

The property loss and destruction of buildings alone will aggregate probably a million dollars. This is regarded as a conservative estimate.

One hundred and fifty of the best residences were swept away.

Among the incidents of the catastrophe was the saving of three lives by Julius Keitley, 70 years old, who rode a mile and a half to do it. James Kernan, the Oregon Railway & Navigation Company agent, met his death at the telephone key trying to call Portland to inform the outside world of the impending calamity. His little daughter Katie, who was saved, said her father and mother were lost in the whirl of the waters. Katie stood by while her father was calling the Portland office, when the flood swept in the lower floor and curled round him. Mrs. Kernan rushed out of the house and started for a high point of ground, but was drowned.

One of the most thrilling adventures was that of Tom Shuter, who, with his family, was "carried" down stream in his house for a mile and a half. His wife and two children went to the upper rooms. Below town the house was shot across the creek to the west side, where it lodged in debris 150 yards from the canyon bank. Shuter then took his little ones and swam two hundred yards. He landed the children and then rescued his wife.

Ione, Ore., June 17.—The names of 189 persons whose bodies have been recovered or who are missing and believed to be dead as a result of the Heppner flood have been obtained. In addition, the bodies of seven Chinese, three Japanese and 21 strangers and babies, whose names are unknown, go to swell the list. More than 100 people remain to be accounted for.

Elise Connor, a stock-rafter of Ione, returned from Heppner to-day with the latest details of the disaster. "It is now known," said Mr. Connor, "that at least 275 or 300 people were drowned. One hundred and fifteen corpses have been hastily buried in wooden boxes, and some were merely wrapped in blankets. There were still several wagon loads of dead on their way to the cemetery when I left. Heppner itself has now been pretty well searched, except piles of debris, where it is thought great numbers of bodies will be found. Between Ione and Heppner there are great piles of debris, but the flood passed so quickly that the roads have not been seriously damaged. In Heppner itself the flood swept a clean path a mile long and two blocks wide."

Estimates of the loss of life differ widely, but the number of dead is certain to reach 300, and it may be 500, when all are accounted for. One hundred and ten bodies have been buried, and it is known that 50 are missing. Still others, who were strangers in the town, are supposed to be among the lost. People are coming here from all directions, in wagons and on horseback, and the work of recovering bodies and burying the dead is proceeding as fast as possible.

Mr. Hugh Clark, M.P.P., is anxiously looking for news of his brother, who has been a merchant at Heppner for several years. Mr. Clark says it is a grazing country, and that as the wires are all down no news can be expected, but no news may be good news.
