

second century, of the fourfold story of the Gospels, into one continuous narrative, now translated from the Arabic manuscript in the Vatican library, is of interest as throwing light on the knowledge possessed by Christians at the date of its compilation, and as the medium through which our Anglo-Saxon ancestors, to a large extent, derived their knowledge of Jesus and His life on earth. **The Bible: A Revelation From God**, by Rev. George Henderson, B.D., Monzie (87 pages, 20c), a little book whose value is not to be measured by its size. It contains, in fact, a most instructive and reassuring discussion of the necessity, method, manners and end of revelation, in the full light of modern critical inquiry.

In **Orientalisms in Bible Lands** (The American Sunday School Union, Philadelphia, 300 pages, profusely illustrated, \$1.00 net), the author, Dr. Edwin Wilbur Rice, presents "the fruit of a lifetime of research, study and thought". A student under Dr. Edward Robinson, the famous American explorer in Bible lands, afterwards associated with Dr. Philip Schaff in preparing his Dictionary of the Bible, and for many years in close correspondence with residents and missionaries in the East, Dr. Rice has had exceptional opportunities of access to first-hand sources of information touching the manners and customs of Bible Lands. He has carefully verified the reports of individual observers by reference to many books of travel. His book, with its fresh light from the everyday life, family, social and commercial, of Eastern peoples, will add a new zest

to the study of the Book which has like surroundings for its setting.

Boy Life and Self-Government* by George Walter Fiske, Professor of Practical Theology in Oberlin Theological Seminary (Young Men's Christian Association Press, New York, 310 pages, \$1.00), is a book for "boy lovers and boy leaders". It is a bright, sensible, often humorous, discussion of the problems connected with the development of the boy into a good Christian citizen. The line on which the solution of these problems must be sought is suggested in the title of the book. It is by learning the art of "self-government", that the boy becomes the right sort of man, and those are his true helpers who lead him to the rulership of his own inner kingdom. How this organizing idea is worked out some of the chapter headings indicate,—such as, A Gymnasium for Citizenship, The Struggle for Manliness, Some By-laws of Boy Leadership, The Boy's Religion, The Boy's Home.

For the chapter on Alcohol alone, with its scientific account of the effect on the human system of that dangerous drug, **The Ontario Public School Hygiene**, by A. P. Knight, M.A., M.D., Professor of Physiology, Queen's University, Kingston (The Copp, Clark Company, Toronto, 248 pages, 20c.) is worth many times its exceedingly low price. But there is no one of its over two score chapters that does not contain the most valuable instruction in the art of healthy living.

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
