## BRITISH PRESTIGE

IN a long, intemperate and ill-balanced arraignment of the British for their conduct of the war, the New York Tribune makes the old mistake of adopting the purely military point of view. But the Tribune's military expert fails to see upon what British prestige is based It has never been affected by a defeat in the field, and this is pecularly true in re-

ce has been destroyed in Afghanistan But ultimately Roberts marched to Candahar. To say nothing of Majuba Hill, the Boers repeatedly defeated the British under humiliating conditions. But the British flag is flying at Pretoria, and the Boers are fighting under it in the field. The Zulus wiped out the Twenty-fourt Regiment at Isandula. But the British govern Zululand, with a handful of white

The New Zealanders were not subdue in the field but by the magnificent diplomacy of the late Sir George Grey. The Egyptians saw Gordon sacrificed and Hicks Pasha's army wiped out. But they fought shoulder to shoulder with the British in Kitchener's march to Khartum. India has seen the British defeated. But these defeats have not affected the prest ige of the British Raj.

Why is it? It is that the Empire is in exhaustible. Ultimately, British bayonet have preceded the most just and equitable colonial administration the world has ever seen. Macaulay pointed out that Warren ings endangered British rule in India, not by any military reverses, but by departure from that uprightness in govern ment which is the real basis of British tige. The British, in fact, win few battles. But they lose no wars; and no nation understands better how to consolidate the fruits of victory.

The Tribune's star writer upon the war would do well to mingle his undoubted) wide knowledge of military history with a little history of the other kind; for it is history of this kind which has built up the British Empire, and has established British prestige among the Mohammedan races and all other governed aliens, on basis which the surrender of General Townshend's army cannot affect in the slightest degree.-Wall Street Journal.
