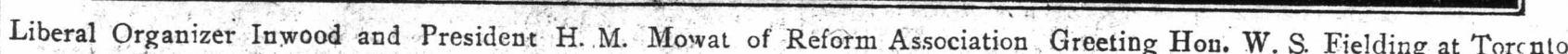


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WOODSTOCK, Oct. 6.—Yesterday afternoon's session of the W. C. T. U. opened with devotional exercise led by Mrs. L. Z. Clark of St. Stephen. The minutes from the last chair and business meeting was read. A report of her medical contact work was read by Mrs. McWee and was adopted. The minutes of the morning session were read and approved. The treasurer's report of her annual address which was very hopeful and instructive. The report of Cor. Perry followed for the year ending September 30, 1926. There are 820 members and a total membership of \$20,700. Honor members 73, new members 85; copies of literature distributed 115,438; books 1,200; tracts 1,000; parlor meetings 34; public meetings 29; total amount raised \$2040.

BULGARIAN SITUATION

LONDON, Oct. 6.—The second and culminating step in the Austro-Hungarian policy of Balkan aggrandizement of themselves at the expense of the status established by the Peace of Berlin was consummated tonight, when Emperor Francis Joseph formally proclaimed the practical annexation of Bosnia and Herzegovina to the dual monarchy.

The present situation is as follows:

Turkey calls upon the powers to preserve to her what they guarantee to her—that Austria and Bulgaria strongly declare their determination to keep what they have taken. Austria is testing bellicently against being hemmed in more strongly between the unpopular neighbors and against the intervention in Bosnia absorbed into the Austro-Hungarian nationality.

LONDON, Oct. 6.—A rumor is current that a petition for divorce is about to be filed in court here by a former American musical comedy star who has been married for nearly two years ago to a young officer in the Guards.

The co-respondent to be named, according to report, is a famous beauty who was married to a British cavalry officer, but was divorced about three years ago. This co-respondent is said to be a beauty of the promise suit against the co-respondent her own suit, who had secretly married an actress.

The suit is said to be a cross suit in contemplation, in which the husband of the American girl will name the co-respondents the eldest son of a Scottish nobleman, who was formerly was in the diplomatic service and the lawyers divorced him two years ago.

The wives reported to have been retained on both sides do not deny that the suit and cross suit are impending, but refuse to say anything about them.

PETITCODIAC, N. P., Oct. 6.—The largest political meeting ever held at Havenock took place last night, when Dr. McAllister and Hon. H. R. Emmerson, the Liberal candidates for Kingston, were opposed by Mr. James G. Smith, Conservative Unionist candidate for the same seat. There was about 800 people present, about 200 standing, and scores could not get even standing room. Dr. McAllister spoke first, referring to the Liberal party as "Dr. Pearson to the Liberals," and alluding to his opponent for over an hour on the general issues, and specially dealing with the Independent Order of Foresters.

Mr. Emmerson followed with one of the best speeches I have heard here, dealing principally with the Intercolonial and branch lines. The meeting then broke up with cheers for the King, Laurier, and the candidates. The closing remarks surprised everyone and the public feeling ran strongly in favor of the Liberal cause.

FREDERICKTON, N. B., Oct. 6.—Rumors from the North Shore and the public indicate a complete sweep for the Liberals. Hon. John P. Baker's friends admit he has no show against Mr. Lord's. He says the Liberalism is a well-known conservative man who reached this city today from Charlotte, says Todd's prospects are daily improving. OTTAWA, Oct. 6.—The Board of Conciliation appointed under the Leprieux Act to investigate the relations of the I. C. R. and the freight clerks has made its finding. It recommends a settlement of the relations of the clerks to the service, which it declares to be "the only way out of the present deadlock." It recommends that the government should then give an increase of from 10 per cent. to 15 per cent. without an increase of the freight rate.

The report recommended that in future there should be no patronage or political pull in connection with appointments to places or to promotions on the clerical staff of the road. "In this way over-manning" would be avoided, and there would be no appointment of new men to the service without the consent of the experienced employees and injurious to the service. The Board consisted of Judge McGibbon and Henry Holgate, Montreal, and J. G. O'Donohue, Ottawa.

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
