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BLEEFED THE SULTAN

British Admiral Threatened to Bombard Muscat--Its Ruler Yielded.

Bombay, Feb. 24.—Important details
regarding the action of the British ad-
miral at Muscat, the capital of the
sultanate of Oman, have just become
public. It appears that the news of
the lease by the sultan of Oman of a
coasting station to France, on the coast
of Oman, leaked out while the British
political agent at Muscat, Maj. Fagan,
was absent. He promptly returned to
his post but the sultan refused to fur-
nish him with any information. The
commander of the gunboat, Sphinx
thereupon despatched a lieutenant and
armed party to Bandar-Josh. But
the sultan, hoping to receive from the
French, continued recalcitrant. The
arrival of the second-class cruiser
Eclipse, flagship of the East India sta-
tion on board the Eclipse at 2 o'clock
Admiral Drummond sent word ashore
that unless the sultan attended a dur-
bar on board the Eclipse at 3 o'clock
that afternoon he would bombard the

OLD WORLD NEWS

What is Going on in Other Parts
of the World.

Rome, Feb. 23.—The Tribune says
that the pope's letter on Americanism
is a confession of the inability of the
Catholic church to face the conquests
of civilization and science.

A SPECIFIC DISEASE.
London, Feb. 24.—Influenza is epi-
demic here. There have been seventy-
four fatalities from the disease this
week. This is the tenth annual epi-
demic of influenza in London. Doc-
tors say it must soon be classed as a
regular disease the same as pneumonia.

THE VATICAN AND PEACE.
Rome, Feb. 24.—The Vatican offi-
cials are taking a new position in re-
gard to the Oza's peace congress. They
say it is useless to cry "peace" when
there is no peace. If the Italian
government succeeds in excluding a
Papal delegate from the peace confer-
ence, they say this would be but a
new proof of the intolerable position
of the Papacy. It was the theft of
the Pope's domain in Italy which drove
the government into the triple alli-
ance, and made such a ruinous attack
on the church. The Vatican does not
think it wise to sanction an effort to
ward universal peace until the church
has come into her own again. One
prelate said yesterday—"Whether we
are invited to the peace congress or
not, the Russian ship of fools will be
wrecked on the rock of St. Peter."

KEEPING THEM DARK.
London, Feb. 23.—The parliamentary
secretary for foreign office, Right Hon.
William St. John Broderick, in the
house of commons, replying to a ques-
tion on the subject, said that in certain
questions the Anglo-American joint
commission had made progress toward
their settlement, and he added, Her
Majesty's government hoped that fur-
ther negotiations would solve the ques-
tions in dispute. The parliamentary
secretary also said that the papers
could not be laid on the table, as the
commissioners had requested that the
proceedings be kept confidential.

Hamilton Has a Very Serious
One on Its Hands.

The Most Popular Minister in that
City Under Suspicion—An Invest-
igation Ordered

Hamilton, Ont., Feb. 24.—The Com-
mittee of Discipline for the Niagara
Synod has appointed a Court of
Visitation composed of five members,
whose duty it will be to investigate
the case against Rev. George H.
Hart, pastor of St. Peter's church, Hamil-
ton, who is accused of being unduly
intimate with an unmarried woman.

Rev. Mr. George H. Hart has been
connected with an ugly rumor which
has been public gossip for some months
past, but until lately no charge had
been preferred against the popular pas-
tor. Now the parents of the girl, who
are well known and highly
respected residents of Hamilton, have
preferred a charge of the above nature
against Mr. George H. Hart, and the church
authorities have been compelled to take
the matter up. Rev. Mr. George H. Hart
is well known for his philanthropy, and
was among the most popular ministers
in the city. He denies the charge, and
says he acted in the capacity of a friend
of the family, whom he knew when a
pastor of a country parish, where they
lived before coming to this city. J.
V. Testes, Q. C., is acting for the
family of the girl. The trial will take
place here on Tuesday night next.

John Brennan, a huckster who was
in trouble, and spent last night in
Barron street jail, had a long talk
with Ben Parrott, accused of murder-
ing his mother. Parrott complains of
the men served in jail, and longs
to get out. He says he would rather
be hanged than spend a year in jail.
He asked Brennan to tell outsiders
that he was insane.

A TEACHER FINED.
Peter Fraser, school teacher at
Green's, in Howard, appeared before
Magistrate McKinnay on Tuesday on
the charge of having punished the
fourteen-year-old son of John Shaw in
a manner contrary to law. H. D.
Sutton appeared for the boy's father,
who was the complainant, and the
teacher defended himself. The evi-
dence showed that the teacher had
used his hands pretty freely and heav-
ily on the boy's head. The teacher
pleaded guilty, but urged great provo-
cation. A fine was imposed of \$5 and
costs. The school session is greatly
excited over the case and, as usual, di-
vided into two factions.
