TWO KNOCKOUTS WERE FEATURES OF THE BOUTS

Big Crowd at Grand Opera House Last Night—A Good Program.

Two surprises were sprung at the boxing bouts at the Grand Opera House last night when Billy Carpenter, lightweight champion of Michigan, was knocked out in the second round of his bout with Billy Brooks of Hamilton and Billy Atkinson of this city followed in his tracks before the skill of Pete Scott of Hamilton, in the first round of their bout.

The bouts were put on before the largest crowd of fans of the season, the pit of the theatre being crowded. In the main wrestling bout of the night between Hank Peters and Harry Ireland and Lee Golden, the former agreed to throw both Ireland and Golden in 40 minutes but failed. Golden only lasted 2 minutes but Ireland stalled the Indian off for 38 minutes.

The first bout was a wrestling match between Alex Smith of Brantford and Billy Munroe of Galt. The former agreed to throw Munroe twice in 30 minutes, but failed. Both men showed a lot of stuff in last night's bout and surely are comers. The full Nelson and the strangle hold were both barred. Both men sparred for sometime and then both went down with Smith on top. Munroe showed some clever work when he wriggled out of a number of difficult holds.

Smith secured a flying fall in 15 minutes, but it was not until after 19-12 minutes of hard work did Smith secure the first fall on an arm hold.

With 10-1-2 minutes left to wrestle Smith failed to get a second fall and therefore lost the bout.

The second bout was between Billy Carpenter, lightweight champion of Michigan and Billy Brooks of Hamilton and was the main boxing bout of the night. Brooks weighed in at 140 lbs. and Carpenter tipped the scales at 136 pounds.

Carpenter proved himself to be the superior of Brooks in boxing and it seemed only a lucky jolt that put him out. Carpenter is a clever little boxer and handles himself very neatly.

He is a clean cut youth and as quick as a cat on his feet with one of the fastest left swings that has ever been seen around here.

The first round was Carpenter's all the way. In fact he knocked Brooks down three times but Referee Fred Minnes refused to count him out although at one time he was down long enough to take two counts.

The second round opened fast with Brooks rushing the fight. Both men clinched and as they broke Brooks landed a right hook to Carpenter's jaw sending him down and out for the count. It was sometime before he came to and immediately he re-challenged Brooks to another bout.

For three rounds Wag Bremner and Kid Hurley, both of this city, battled on pretty even terms. Bremner was a little more scientific than Hurley and was declared winner on points.

The main wrestling bout of the evening was between Hank Peters, the Hagersville Indian and Lee Golden and Harry Ireland, in which the former threw Golden in 2 minutes, but failed to throw Ireland in 38 minutes. Peters got Golden on a toe hold and forced him to quit.

Ireland and Peters sparred for 25 minutes, the former wanting the Indian off and staying on his feet. Peters tried desperately to get a hold on Ireland but the latter was wiley and kept on his feet. In this bout the hammerlock, strangle and full Nelson were barred.

Peters is a big husky, good looking Indian who weighed in at 172-12-2. The Ireland was half a pound lighter while Golden only weighed 157.

At the close of the bout Peters asked for another chance to get at Ireland and was accepted. It was only yesterday that Peters was notified of the bouts and he had not had time to show his ability enough to do something more than act on the defensive. Had the two mixed on the mat, the bout would have been a good one.
