HUGHTOWN, Scilly Islands, June 14.—The saving of the passengers of part willingly and well. the wrecked Belgian Steamer Gotthand was attended by almost superhuman efforts on the part of the officers and crew of the steamer and by the life saving boats' crews which came to the rescue when she went ashort on the Crim Rocks vesterday.

Members of the life saving crew from St. Mary's describe the scene as awful, when one of the Gothland's small boats crammed with passengers and seamen, broke away from the davits and fell thirty feet into the sea. The bottom of the boat was smashed by its violent contact with the waves and all were thrown into the water. Most of the passengers who had occupied the boat were women and children and they struggled helplesly in the waves. A quartermaster of the Gothland sprang from the steamer's
