AS PRIVATE

A Methodist Minister From the States Joins 99th Battalion.

Windsor, Jan. 14.—Rev. Geo. W. Plewes, a Methodist clergyman from Bellaire, Mich., yesterday afternoon signed an attestation paper in the 99th Battalion here.

For months Mr. Plewes told the recruiting sergeant at the armories he has been haunted night and day by the blast of bugles and the cry of the wounded. Finally so strong did his conviction become, that he overcame his wife's objections and came to Windsor to enlist. He is 35 years old, married, and had no difficulty in passing the required medical examination. He was born in Newcastleton-Tyne, England, but has lived in the United States for the past ten years.

THE ALLIES

Continue to Land Troops at Saloniki in Large Numbers.

Jan. 14.—(By Sayville wireless)—Despatches from Sofia say that information has been brought there by a person who left Saloniki on January 8, to the effect that the allies continue to land forces on a considerably increased scale, at Saloniki and at Orfano Bay, 50 miles to the northeast of Saloniki. Despite the heavy forces already landed and no purpose of taking of the offensive has yet been displayed on the part of the allies, who, according to this information, have completed their second line of defense and are working actively to finish their first line.

The allies at Saloniki are said to have grown exceedingly optimistic, and their officers express the belief that they can make a second Ypres of Saloniki.

Other despatches from Sofia give details of the attack by the squadron of twelve German aeroplanes on the British camp at Kilindir, near Saloniki, on which occasion, it is stated, several aeroplanes were started by the dropping of incendiary bombs.

Details are also given of the counter attack by French airmen, two of whom were forced to descend.

Melbourne, Australia, Dec. 20.—(Correspondence)—One of the first official acts of the new prime minister of Australia, William M. Hughes, has been an announcement that a fresh army will be furnished by the Commonwealth, and that this army will be sent to the front in the near future.

"A government appeal will be made by mail to every man in Australia within the military age group based on the recent war census—that is single men, from 19 to 44 years.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST LAND REGULATIONS.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 25 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of land in each of three Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Application must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub Agency) on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months' residence upon cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within five miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 20 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the field. In good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months' residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 20 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent is obtained. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years on at least 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough cultivation. Pre-emption is subject to the same conditions. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
