THE VILLAGE COUNCIL

The village council has had rather a kaleidoscopic opening of the year's business, but is now thoroughly organized and ready for work.

Following the organization meeting, a meeting was held on Friday evening last at which it was made known that Mr S. C. A. Lamb could not accept his appointment as clerk, and other changes were impending. At this meeting also it was learned that the legality of the by-law appointing village officers was open to question owing to informalities in passing it.

On Monday evening the council again met and re-enacted the by-law in question, appointing Mr J. E. Burell to the office of village clerk and the other officers as previously named.

Preparations for submitting the by-law to raise money by debentures for local improvements will be proceeded with at once.

A COMPLETE VINDICATION

The principal case on the docket of Athens Division Court, on Thursday last, was the trial of the appeal entered against the conviction recorded by Police Magistrate Deacon recently in the case of Walton Sheffield vs. Harold Jacob.

The defendant was charged in the court at Brockville with having shot Sheffield's dog on the evening of October 22, and though Jacob and a young companion, Leonard Sly, who were out driving on that evening, swore that they were not within a mile of Sheffield's house, witnesses testified that they saw the Jacob rig on the road near where the shooting took place. The conviction called upon Jacob to pay a fine of \$5.00, damages of \$20, and costs of \$21.45. An appeal was at once entered.

This case attracted widespread attention, and when the appeal case was called here before His Honor Judge Reynolds the large auditorium and gallery of the town hall were filled with people from many miles around as well as with residents of the village, including many of Harold's student friends.

The evidence given for the prosecution in Brockville was repeated here, but it contained nothing directly connecting Jacob with the shooting. The story told by Harold Jacob and Leonard Sly of their movements on that evening had an impressive ring of genuineness, and the corroborative testimony that followed prepared all for the Judge's decision, which reversed the verdict of the police magistrate and required Sheffield to pay the costs of both courts.

Cheers that could not be suppressed followed the verdict, and Harold was congratulated on all sides over his complete vindication.

H. A. Stewart, K.C., appeared for Jacob and C. R. Deacon for Sheffield.

A REPORT CORRECTED

Mr J. A. Raddick, writing the Reporter this week, says:—

"Mr Geo H. Barr, who was Official Referee of Butter and Cheese at Montreal last season, in speaking of his work at the recent Dairy Convention held at Picton, Ont., made the statement that 'only 2 per cent of the cheese which he examined were of No. 1 grade.' This statement has been widely quoted as showing a serious condition in the Canadian Cheese Trade. As there is nothing in the statement itself or in the facts of the case to warrant such a conclusion, I ask your permission to make the following explanation.

"As Mr Barr explained in his statement, he examined less than half of 1 per cent, or about one lot out of every 200 lots of cheese received at Montreal during the season, and further, as he was asked to examine only those lots which were suspected of being inferior in quality, or which had been condemned by the purchasers, it is not surprising that only 2 per cent were first grade. The showing is a remarkably good one rather than a bad one."
