Then a Tennessee Man! Was Drowned a Few Minutes Later.

Memphis, Tenn., June 5 .- With less than three minutes after having received the sacrament of baptism and the benediction of his pastor James Phillips was yester-day drowned in the water in which he had been baptized in the presence of helpless and berrified brethern of his congregation and

Hence Hastings' Evidence Cannot be Secured in the

West Elgin Investigation-The Commission in a Hurry to Wind Up.

Toronto, June 5.-The West Elgin commissioners yesterday heard further evidence from Mr. Cartwright and other officials at Osgoode Hall respecting the custody of the ballot boxes during the scruting, and other court proceedings while they were out of the custody of Col. Clark, Clerk of the Legislature. At first it was thought that the ballots had been spirited away for a week somewhere during the court proceedings, but this during the court proceedings, but this morning it was brought out in evidence that although the wrong box, that of East Elgin, had been delivered at Osgoode Hall, and had lain there unopened for a week in the belief that it was the West Elgin one, there was nothing to indicate that the West Elgin box, had, been tampered with Elgin box had been tampered with vault at the buildings till the mistake was discovered. If, therefore, the ballots were tampered with before the recount, and good ballots for MacNish substituted for the switched ones, the change must have been made at a date prior to the receipt of the boxes by Col. Clarke ..

The commissioners yesterday afternoon decided to close the case, and unless further evidence of the importance is offered before the stenographer's notes are extended, no more hearings will be taken. Before closing the commissioners received a report from the Sheriff of London that he had had a constable for two days trying to effect service of a summons on Mr. Hastings, but he could not be found in London, notwithstanding Mrs, Prichett's statement that she had seen him there two weeks. him there two weeks ago. The com-mission received also a telegram from the proprietor of the hotel in Detroit at which it had been sworn that Prit-chett and Lewis were. The proprietor contradicted this, and says, that he and his staff will testify that no such interviews ever took place in his hotel
