TURNEDOUT OF THEIR CAVES

The French Declared That the Inhabit Caverns Were Dens of Thieves. Oran, one of the chief ports of Algeria, is most picturesquely situated on a curving shore of the Mediterranean, at the foot of a frowning height to the west, on whose slope the forts, one above another, grimly guard the town, and are a standing menace to any nation who should conceive the idea of wrestling this African city from France. A number of ravines diverging from the city gates on the land side are the convenient caravan and wagon routes into the interior. Along the steep side of a ravine that leads inland from the Santon gate, some distance from the city, are a number of artificial caverns that were dug, noone knows where in the igneous or volcanic rock known as tufa, which not being very hard lends itself readily to excavation. The entrances to these caverns are low and narrow, but within, the rock has been hollowed out into quite spacious apartments and in some cases has been partitioned into two or more rooms. Twelve of these caverns are known and, strange as it may seem, the authorities of Oran as-mert that there are others whose entrances have not yet been discovered The largest cavern has four rooms and there are twenty-nine apartments in

serious attention. All these caves have been used as human habitations and their occupants were ostensibly innocent Spanish set-tlers and families of Gypsies. The real, fact, however, is said to be that the subterranean dwellings have become the homes of thieves, the dark recesses being used by brigands as a hiding place for their booty. It is more than suspected that they were originally excavated to serve the purposes of outlaw, and the fact seems to be established that of late years they nave been restored to their early

phase of utility. So the government has recently undertaken a work of eviction. All these were proved guilty of lawless doings, modern trogladytes were turned into the outer air and some of them, who were provided with other secluded quarters in the city jant. The one thing that can be said in their favor is that they had made their under-ground homes quite habitable. They are really far more comfortable living places than many of the apartments occupied by the poor in large cities of the most civilized lands.

Nearly all the rooms are found to be neatly whitewashed. The air is pure because from each apartment a venti-lating shaft leads through the rock above to the open air. There are doors and chimney, and the largest cavern is a two story affair with a staircase dug out of the rock leading to the up-per story. The drainage is perfect and every cavern is absolutly dry.

These homes in the earth are really ingenious and excellent in their way and it will be a pity if the people of Oran do not find some use for them. Their temperature is invariably cool and if they might be transferred to Germany they would probably be used as beer vaults. If we might plant them in the Palisades, some Yankee owman might turn many an honest penny by collecting in them a few mummies and other prehistoric relics and exhibiting the caves as the home

of the "only original" troglodytes. Twenty Million Pins Per Day. It requires an average of more than twenty million pins per day to sustain the falling skirts, replace the missing suspender buttons and meet the other needs of the American people. What becomes of all these pins is a question that nobody has been able to answer, but there is no falling off in the demand, so that this number must disappear in some manner every day.

It is hard to imagine anything simoler than a pin, and it is a striking oof of the complications of our modern industrial system that every pin course of its manufacture passes through 4 dozen separate processes, involving the greatest skill on the part of the operatives employed and the action of a great amount of autematic machinery.

The pin makes its appearance at the factory in the form of barrels of coiled brass wire. The first process is that of straightening this wire. The coils are placed on revolving racks; and fed from these into little machines, from the vice-like grip of which they emerge perfectly straight. Thence the wire is fed into the pinmaking machine, which is almost as complicated as a printing press. A sharp kulfe-cuts the wire off into uniform lengths of the desired size. As each little length of wire drops from the knife it falls upon a small wheel, the edge of which is notched into groves just large enough to hold the bits of wire. Each piece is carried along by the

wheel until an iron finger and thumb selze and hold it firmly, while an aucomatic hammer, by a single smart
blow, puts a head on one end. Then
the embryo pins fall upon another
g poved wheel, which revolves horizontally. As they move on in the clasp of this second wheel the projecting ends pass over a number of circular steel files, which neatly grind them to a point. Further on they en-counter a pumics stone, which smoothes off the filed ends, and then they drop into a wooden receiving box. So 'ar no workman's hands has touched the pins in their progress from the reel. The cutting, heading, pointing and smoothing has all been done by the wonderful automatic machinery. From the wooden boxes the pins go

to the "whitening" room, where they are cleaned in revolving barrels filled with sawdust and receive a nickel oating in big vats. Then they are dried in the sawdust barrels and are rum through a "sorting" machine. It is impossible to get the better of this

The big department stores and wholesale dealers buy their pins by the case. A case contains 108 dozen papers, 360 pins in each paper. A single order from the largest stores usually calls for 100 cases, or nearly 50,
