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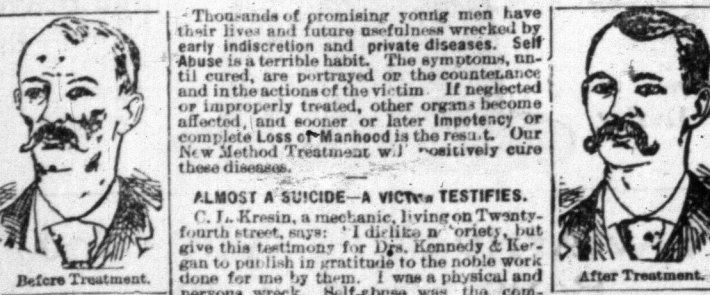

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## Township Councils.

### Harwich Council.

A special meeting of the Council of the Township of Harwich was held on Wednesday, Feb. 13th.

A communication was read from Messrs. Wilson, Kerr & Pike, re the Erie Road.

Young—Buchanan—That this Council authorize the Reeve and the Clerk to sign the agreement drawn to tripartite between the L. E. & D. R. R. Co., and the municipality of Harwich with reference to a road through lands they claim is theirs, laid out along the Lake shore near the Rond Eau Piers.—Carried.

Morrison—Buchanan—That that part of road division No. 8, west of the E. & H. Ry., as per request of ratepayers be set off as a separate road division, and shall be known as division No. 14, and old division No. 14 be struck off; also that that road division No. 54 be divided at the line between lots number 21 and 22 and made into two; that portion to the south of said line to be known as No. 54, and the portion to the north to be known as No. 54, and to be extended to the north and westward, between the River Thames and Communication road; also that road division No. 111 be made into two, dividing it at the middle of lot 13, that part of the east to be known as No. 111 and that portion to the west to be added to No. 112.—Carried.

A communication was handed in from Dr. S. G. Storey re a poor boy ill at Gilbert Phillips, by name Eric Bulby.

Buchanan—Morrison—That Mr. G. Phillips be instructed to place the young man, Eric Bulby, in the Chatham hospital for treatment, and the Reeve be instructed to be present when the patient is received and make arrangements; also that Geo. M. Baird be paid the fee for registration of births, marriages and deaths for the year 1900, as per certificate from the Registrar General and charge to general fund—\$46.20. Carried.

By-law No. 756 for the appointment of certain officers of the Township was passed through its various stages and finally passed.

A regular meeting of Harwich Council held Monday 11th inst. Communications were received from the Clerk of Raleigh re the expenses of Harwich in connection with publication, etc., of the Gregory Creek Drain By-law, also re gravel-pit at Buckhorn.

An agreement was presented duly signed, between the County of Kent and the Townships of Howard and Harwich re Kent Bridge approach, also between the L. E. & D. R. R. Co. and the Municipality re the Road at Erieau.

A communication was read from Albert Cable re accident he had with together with an order for him on board while working at Gray's, also stating that he had gone back to the House of Refuge.

A petition was received from John J. McElroy and others asking for a change in road division 61 and 62.

Young—McCormick—that in accordance with a petition presented to this council, the following changes be made in the road division No. 18 and 19 sideroad, that con. 12 and 13 form one division and 19 and 11 be another and that the central division be numbered 1/2 between the numbers on either side. Carried.

A petition was received from W. S. Hewitt and others asking for a change in the boundaries of school section No. 5 united, so as to form a new section out of the lands north of the town of Blenheim and lands from other adjoining sections.

Morrison—Buchanan—That this council entertain the petition asking a new section to be formed north of Blenheim and lands from other adjoining sections.

That R. Young be appointed to confer with Dr. Stevenson as to injuries received by Robert Sted from being thrown out of a rig on account of a defective culvert in Harwich.—Carried.

McCormick—Buchanan—That the Clerk write to the L. E. & D. R. Ry. if they will deliver gravel at same rate as last season; also asking the Engineer to fix a date to meet a committee of the council at Fargo re the culvert at Erieau; also re a crossing over their roadway which is not graded so as to be safe for crossing.—Carried.

Buchanan—Morrison—That should the Blinder Twine Co. be a site and establish their factory in Harwich this council will grant them exemption from taxes on the land and plant for the term of 10 years.—Carried.

Morrison—Buchanan—That where given roadways run through property the owners of said property should not be assessed for such roadway and that the assessor be instructed to assess the owners of said lands less the amount of land taken for said roadway.—Carried.

Young—McCormick—That \$50 be granted to build a dock at or near Shrewsbury, provided the Dominion Government will grant \$100 and the parties directly interested will give \$50.—Carried.

Morrison—Buchanan—That A. B. Patterson and others, near Northwood, be granted the sum of \$25 as a portion of the cost of a sidewalk constructed at Northwood, as they, the parties, have contributed freely towards it.—Carried.

Wilson, wood for A. D. Peck, \$5.50; G. J. Marshall, gravelling, \$12.10; H. L. Merritt, lumber, \$2.24; Lesley Johnston, sheep killed, \$16.00; W. T. McEachran, refund dog tax, not as-

essed, \$1.00; John Chis, work, con. 6, R. T., \$3.00; Charles Gregory, farm bridge on Gregory Creek drain, \$5.00; James Gregory, farm bridge on Gregory Creek drain, \$15.00. The by-law on the Gregory Creek drain was read a third time and finally passed.

### Tilbury East Council.

Tilbury East Council met in Town Hall Valetta, on Monday, March 11th, 1901.

The Clerk, Mr. Farquharson, having recently been appointed Collector of Customs for the county of Kent tendered his resignation after having filled the position in a most acceptable manner for 28 years.

Alexander Farquharson was chosen to succeed his brother at a salary of \$400 per annum and extras for the following services:—Registering Births, Marriages and Deaths, appeals to the Judge, under the Voters List Act, and reasonable remuneration for services rendered under the Ditches and Water Course Act.

A large and influential deputation of ratepayers, consisting among others of Henry Sales, James Stewart, M. Campbell, James Ross, James Smith, Peter Richards, M. Gleason, D. Laughton and John Davidson addressed the council recommending that the sum of \$75 be appropriated towards purchasing a gold watch as a tangible appreciation of Mr. Farquharson's long and faithful service to the township.

Graham—Marshall—That whereas it has become known to this Council that our esteemed and honored Clerk, D. R. Farquharson, has been honored by the appointment by the Government of Canada to a higher position in public life, which appointment deprives us of a valuable and efficient officer, who for the past 28 years has served this municipality as Township Clerk in a proficient and able manner, therefore we, as members of Tilbury East Council wish to express our highest appreciation of his services and our gratification that he has secured such an honorable position from the Government.

We deeply regret our loss in accepting his resignation, but trust that what will be our loss will be his gain, and in vacating the clerkship's chair, of this municipality, Mr. Farquharson takes with him the best wishes of the members of this council for his future happiness and prosperity and that as a slight token of our appreciation of his extra services to the Council and Township, this council grant \$75.00 towards the purchase of a gold watch to be presented to him before his departure for Chatham. Carried.

Marshall—Graham—That this council decline to give Wm. Stoker a deed of road allowance known as Con. 4, opposite lot No. 1, and that they are prepared to give a deed to the C. P. R. Ry. according to agreement. Carried.

Marshall—Warnock—That account of Reeve Fletcher be paid and that the Reeve give an order for same. Expenses re delegation to Toronto being \$12.00.

The following accounts were passed and ordered paid:—Park Brothers, repairs on Forbes pump No. 2, \$4.22; Robert Fletcher for notifying council re special meeting, \$1.00; R. Williams going to C. P. R. and Hutton & Wilson, printing account in 1900, \$5.22; Andrew Gilbert for use of garage Hall for collection, \$5.00; A. A. Wilson, renewal premium on pump-house, No. 1 and 2, \$45.00; R. S. Woods, Judge, re Barry appeal, \$5.25; D. R. Farquharson, registering births, marriages and deaths in 1900, \$33.80; Municipal World, stationery account, \$6.25; Balance of salary due D. R. Farquharson for salary as clerk, \$66.66; Postage and expenses to Toronto \$14.00.

Graham—Marshall—That claim of Wilson, Kerr & Pike for legal services be referred to the Reeve to investigate, with power to settle. Carried.

Warnock—Marshall—That we rescind the motion of January 14th appointing Mr. Smith, C. E. and hereby appoint Mr. Newham as Township engineer under the Ditches and Water Courses Act; also under the Township Act appointing an engineer. Carried.

Moved in amendment by Graham and Clark that A. McDonnell, C. E., be appointed engineer under the Ditches and Water Courses Act. Motion carried; amendment lost.

Clark—Warnock—That Camille Robert be refunded \$1.00 for dog, died before the 1st of Jan., 1900. Carried.

Clark—Wilson—That grievance of William Ward re King and Whittle drain be referred to Councillor Warnock to investigate with power to settle. Carried.

Clark—Warnock—That A. A. Wilson be paid \$2.00 for preparing deed in duplicate—Amos Kelly to corporation. Carried.

Warnock—Clark—The following gentlemen were appointed inspectors of sheep worried by dogs:—Alvin Mallot, Thomas Norrey, Matthew Campbell and Henry Atkinson; salary to be \$1.50 per day while employed. Carried.

Marshall—Graham—That County Commissioner Ross be paid \$5.00 re selling Forbes drainage debentures and that the same be charged to Forbes Works. Carried.

Warnock—Marshall—That Jonas Peltier be sent to the poorhouse in Chatham as he is in destitute circumstances and that John Clark be empowered to send him there. Carried.

Auditors' Report prepared by P. G. Murphy and J. N. Halliday was submitted and read and on motion of Graham and Marshall was adopted and the auditors ordered paid \$15.00 each, as for By-Law.

Mr. Shaver addressed the council urging them to provide some means of draining the lands in the 12th and 13th concessions between the 15th and 16th Side Road west to the town-line.

Warnock—Marshall—That the Clerk notify C. F. Smith to clean out the ditch and road of sawdust, slabs and rubbish opposite lot 19 in the 9th concession. Carried.

### Sugar as a Food.

The craving for sugar is said to be natural, and particularly in children, who are continually in motion, and in those doing work requiring great physical exertion. Sugar is a heat and energy-producing food, and in moderate amounts is readily digested and assimilated. An excess of sugar, however, causes an acid condition of the stomach.

In many cases of indigestion, producing food in a form more readily assimilated than either starch or fats and oils. We should remember that, although sugar is a valuable food, it is a concentrated form of nourishment, and should be eaten in moderation, especially by those leading a sedentary life.
