The craving for sugar is said to be natural, and particularly in children, who are continually in motion, and in those doing work requiring great physical exertion. Sugar is a heat and energy-producing lood, and in moderate amounts is readily digested and assimilated. An excess of sugar, however, causes an acid condition of the stomach.
