WILL MAKE IMPROVEMENTS

Rond Eau Park Will Undergo Several Important Necessary Changes

THE OFFICIAL VISIT

Ridgetown, May 25.—Hon. F. Cochrane, Minister of Crown Lands and Mines; Dr. Clark, of Guelph, the great reforestry man, and P. H. Bowyer, M. P. P., and B. W. Wilson, of Ridgetown, visited Rond Eau Government Park last week to decide on improvements for the coming season.

Both Mr. Cochrane and Dr. Clark expressed themselves as very much surprised with the natural beauties of this famous summer resort. The new pavilion will have a 15 foot lean-to at the back and a verandah 10 feet wide will grace one end and the side fronting on the Eau.

A sawmill will likely be operated on the park next winter when the fallen timber will be cut up into lumber to be used in making improvements the following summer.

The road leading through the woods to the point at Eriess, a distance of seven miles, will also be improved, so as to allow rigs free access to the point.

100 BARRELS A DAY

A Great Oil Well Was Struck Six Miles East of Tilbury—A Gusher

Tilbury, May 25.—At 4.30 to-day a monster oil well was struck by Church, Norton and Bowby on the Harwood Marshall farm six miles east of Tilbury at a depth of 1,370 feet.

A flow of oil was encountered in the upper strata, which is flowing to-day at the rate of 100 barrels per day.

In this territory, the second and third pays are much richer than the first.

Drilling has been suspended pending the erection of several 250 barrel tanks.

This is the fourth well in this territory and is by far the most prolific producer.

Oil men are very sanguine and are making desperate efforts to lease territory.
