Public Notice.

The Committee on Streets wish to call attention to the following by-law, and they request its strict observance by the citizens:—

28. No person, except under the direction of the superintendent of streets, shall throw, place or put any filth, dirt, rubbish, ashes, straw, papers, sweepings, or other things on any street, thoroughfare, or lane, or into any public place in the town, under a penalty not exceeding ten dollars for each offence, and on non-payment hereof to imprisonment in jail for a period not exceeding twenty days.
