The French battleship, Liberté, one of the finest ships of the fleet, was totally destroyed by an explosion of her magazines, at Toulon on Monday. The disaster was caused by an outbreak of fire at 4 a. m. The flames spread rapidly in spite of all efforts to master them, and reached the magazines before there was time to flood them. The magazines exploded with tremendous violence, sending death and destruction in every direction. It is estimated that nearly 400 lives were lost. Looks Like Plot to Destroy Navy. Toulon, September 27.—Despite the opinion of the naval officers, it is confirmed that fires broke out on the Patrie and Suffren on the morning that the Liberté was destroyed. This adds to the general mystification. Lieutenant Garnier, who was temporarily in command of the Liberté at the time of the explosion, was asked by one of the junior officers sometime before the final explosion if the magazines ought not to be flooded. He replied 'wait,' apparently having in mind the fact that the commander of the battleship Brennus had flooded his magazines when fire was discovered near them four months ago and later was prevented by a board of inquiry for premature flooding, resulting in the destruction of ammunition worth \$40,000. OTTAWA, September 25.—It is possible that the departure of Earl Grey, who is expected to leave here next week, may be delayed and possibly also the coming of the Duke of Connaught. The reason given is the new government will not be installed before the arrival of the duke, who is inexperienced in the position of governor general. The Laurier administration will not likely resign within a week and possibly not within two weeks. It is expected that Sir Wilfrid Laurier will hand over the reins of government to Mr. R. L. Borden next week.

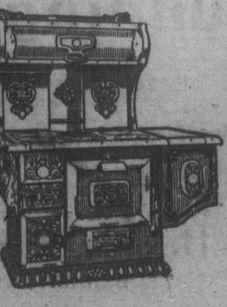
