The Zulu War.

The Battle of Rorke's Drift. The most interesting matter received the last mail from the Cape is the following explicit account, contained in a private letter, of the HEROIC ACTION AT RORKE'S DRIFT.

It gives by far the best description of that action yet received:-"On the same day as the fatal battle and disaster that befel our troops at Isandula, when among other terrible casualties, 21 officers and upwards of regiment, lost their lives in defending their camp and colors, a Zulu army
