

German Warships Leave Kiel for the Baltic Manoeuvres.

Kiel, Aug. 18 .- The entire Germa fleet, comprising 40 batleships and ar mored cruisers and 50 torpedo boats and torpedo-boat destroyers, left here to-day to take part in the extensive summer manoeuvres under the com-mand of Prince Henry of Prussia, who is no board the flagship Deutschisnd.
