The House of Assembly has been for the greater part of the last week, sitting as a Committee of Privileges in consequence of an expression used by Edward Palmer, Esq., the member for Charlottetown—under circumstances of great provocation—imputing perjury to some member or members of that House, in swearing to qualifications which he or they knew themselves to be destitute of. The Hon. Edward Whelan, for reasons best known to himself, chose to assume, that he was the person so stigmatized, and appealed to the House for protection. The House responded to the appeal, and took the matter into special consideration. As we shall, at some future day, when we have been put in possession of the facts given in evidence before the Committee of Privileges, enter fully into a discussion of the propriety of the measures adopted on this occasion, by the House, we shall, for the present, refrain from entering into particulars, further than to say, that the House having proposed to Mr. Palmer that he should apologize to Mr. Whelan, or make good his assertion, Mr. Palmer preferred the latter alternative. The House having formed itself into a Committee of Privileges, after hearing a number of witnesses, came to the following resolutions:—

Resolved, As the opinion of this Committee, that Edward Palmer, Esq., has failed to substantiate his implied charge of Perjury against the Hon. Edward Whelan, a member of this House, as made by him during the Debate on the Lawyers' Bill.

Resolved, As the opinion of this Committee, that the Deed had on the Table of the House by the Hon. Edward Whelan, is a sufficient qualification to entitle him to a seat in this House, as a member thereof.

Resolved, That as Edward Palmer, Esq., a Member of this House, has failed to prove the charge—by implication—of Perjury made by him against the Hon. Edward Whelan, he called upon by the House to retract and apologize, in accordance with the Resolutions, of the House, of the 2d March, instant.

With the first and second resolutions we have nothing to do at present, their propriety or impropriety, truth or falsehood, will receive a full and impartial investigation hereafter. With the requisitions of the third, Mr. Palmer very judiciously and properly complied; it being the duty of every member of a particular society, voluntarily to submit to the will of the majority, when that submission is accompanied by no personal degradation or loss of honor. Taking a false oath does not necessarily imply, that the party has been guilty of perjury; and, although Mr. Palmer may be, and probably is, as well, if not more fully convinced, that Mr. Whelan has no legal qualification to entitle him to a seat in that House, as he was before the investigation began, yet he did right in retracting the words which implied that he had been guilty of perjury. He was of necessity, obliged to make some sacrifice of his own personal feelings to a sense of the duty he owed to his constituents; who would, in case of his continuance, have been left unrepresented, and that, too, at a time when many matters in which their interests are concerned, are under consideration.

It was matter of policy to succumb for the moment, as it was evident nothing would have given more sincere pleasure to the partisans of Mr. Whelan, than that Mr. Palmer should have declined to act in accordance with the resolution, and thereby rid of an opponent who has been, and will continue to be one of the most powerful obstacles to their continuance in office. There was another reason which, we doubt not, had much weight with Mr. Palmer. Among all the votes of the House, there was not an opinion expressed, which tended to exonerate, still less honorably acquit Mr. Whelan from that suspicion of the offence, which necessarily arose out of the evidence adduced at the bar. Mr. Clark openly expressed himself, as not having his mind by any means relieved from suspicion, with respect to Whelan's qualification.

Under all the circumstances of the case, we are—repeat—satisfied, that Mr. Palmer could not have acted otherwise than he did; and, that he has come out of the affair without the slightest loss of honor or decrease of reputation. We must not, however, be understood as willing to afford any sanction to the personal remarks and allusions to private character, which are so frequently resorted to, and are so great a scandal to the House of Assembly. Had not the provocation given by Mr. Whelan to Mr. Palmer, been of the grossest nature, the conduct of the latter would have been highly reprehensible; but we must say, we can give great lengths in case of language, however severe, which is provoked by a dastardly, unmanly attack on the memory of a deceased father. Mr. Palmer, has, it is true, retracted the accusation of perjury, as connected with Mr. Whelan's swearing to his qualification, but we shall have leave to suspend our opinion on that score, until we have carefully sifted the evidence. We have not only no respect, but the most perfect contempt for the decisions of the present House of Assembly in matters connected with elections or election law; there which was extensive and notorious on the Government side of the House, and which has done more to bring the House into disrepute, than any other cause of the present session, and to provide for all charges and expenses.

We perceive in the Royal Gazette of yesterday, that the words "He retracted the charge accordingly," are put in Roman capitals, for the purpose of attracting attention. The imputation of perjury, it is true, has been retracted; but what is the relative situation of the parties? This; Mr. Palmer stands in the situation of a plaintiff who has been acquitted, and Mr. Whelan is that of a criminal at a Scottish Bar, when the verdict, instead of being NOT GUILTY, is NOT PROVEN.

GEORGETOWN COURT.

The March Term of the Supreme Court was opened at Georgetown, on the 9th inst., by His Honor Mr. Justice Peters. The criminal calendar was light; yet it was melancholy to see three youths—the eldest not above 18 years of age—charged with stealing wheat; they were convicted and sentenced, two to 3 months' imprisonment, and one to 3 months; the latter had been concerned in two takings, though they might have been and were considered as one robbery. A boy also, for stealing cloth, was sentenced to 2 months' imprisonment. He was evidently of weak intellect, but had some perceptions of right and wrong, sufficient to warrant the finding him guilty. The learned Judge did not fail to caution them to avoid any thing that might bring them before him a second time, as in that case they would not escape so easily. Succession, a colored man, was tried for receiving stolen goods, but acquitted. There was but one record trial, Doe dem. Boggs vs. Chalmers. A question was raised in this case by Lawson, counsel for the defendant, as to the validity of a deed which purported to be executed by Alex. Leslie

into High Sheriff, by Peter McCallum, late Under Sheriff; Mr. Lawson contending that the power of the Under Sheriff ceased, the instant the High Sheriff went out of office. The point was reserved. A summary case and some appeals completed the Docket.

A question respecting the powers and duties of Protective Officers of the local revenue, arose out of a Rule obtained in vacation, by Mr. Lawson, to show cause, why certain causes before James McDonald and Emanuel McEachren, Esqs., J.P., should not be removed into the Supreme Court; but as the decision is one of much importance, we shall give a detailed Report of it in a future number.

We must not omit stating, that the learned Judge, in giving his charge to the Grand Jury, entered into a lucid display of the advantages that were likely to result to the Colony from the adoption of a system of free education, contemplated by the Legislature, particularly if conjoined with the rudiments of agricultural knowledge.

We have received, from the Reporter of the House of Assembly the Report of the proceedings, and debate in the Committee of Privileges on the investigation which arose out of the imputation cast upon Mr. Whelan by Mr. Palmer, the greater part of which is in type. We expect to give the whole in an Extra, or in our next number.
