The table of relative popul tions in the cities in 1901 as con pared with 1891, shows the Charlottetown increased 707 dur ing the decennial period. The increase in the population through out the Dominion has been prin cipally in the cities, while th rural districts have gone behin in many places. There has no been wanting evidence that th most strenuous efforts had been put forth by the Governmen officials to inflate the population of Quebec out of all due propor tion to the other Provinces, i order that the Parliamentary re presentation of these latter migh be proportionately lessened.
