LOCAL & OTHER ITEMS

Cheese sold at the board meeting last Friday for 12 to 16 cents a pound. It was slightly dreggy above 270 in Boston Monday last. One man was overcome by the heat and died. The cruised Vigilant brought into the harbor of Dover, Oct. 90 nets belonging to the American tug Baltimore which were set inside the International line. Ald. Patrick Dinan was taken ill at the Council meeting in Quebec last Wednesday night. A priest and notary were called. He was able to make his will and then expired. At the Interstate Fair at Spokane, Washington, Canadian wheat exhibited took three firsts, Canadian oats and flax one first each, and Canadian barley a second prize. Tom Longboat won a fifteen mile race at Windsor in a time of four on Saturday night. His best Able Wood of Montreal by less than six inches. The time was one hour, 21 minutes, 35 seconds. Mrs. McGee, whose death sentence has been commuted to life imprisonment, was taken to the Penitentiary at Dorchester, N. B., on Friday last, in charge of Sheriff Carter of King's County, and Constable McCarron. Major General Sir John French, chief of Staff of the British army, reached New York Saturday on the Lusitania on a trip for the improvement of his health, which will take him as far west as Denver. The Grand Stand on the grounds of the Abegweit Athletic Association in this city, was burned to the ground on Wednesday afternoon last. There was no insurance. It is thought to have been set on fire by some young lad either by accident or intentionally. Those who purpose to become candidates for the Prince Edward Island Rhodes Scholarship for 1913 are requested to send their applications and credentials to the Superintendent of Education, Charlottetown, on or before the first of November next. Premier Matheson returned to Charlottetown from his trip to the Pacific Coast on Wednesday evening last. He enjoyed his trip very much and greatly admired the western country and its optimism, but returns more than ever impressed with the great opportunities now opening up in our Island Province. Alfred Lee, member of an Ottawa party of eight which returned to Ottawa from Uxva on the 2nd says stories of diamonds in that country are true and the party made important discoveries. Lee says tests have shown the stones found to be the real thing and that the party will again go north in about 10 days. At New Westminster prison, B. C., on Saturday, Howard Johnson was killed while preventing the escape of H. Wilson and Joseph Smith. They were in for long terms for burglary. By force and strategy they overcame several guards till Johnson came along and fired at them. One picked up the guard's rifle and shot Johnson. Wilson was shot and wounded and both were then overpowered. Winnipeg advice of the 4th inst. says: The security of men for threshing and farm work is so pressing in this district that twelve men serving time in the cells here for minor offenses, were released today, eight being turned over to one man and four to another, who promised them work at respectable wages. Other applications are expected and will be extended, when possible, by the magistrates, on recommendation from the police chief. We regret to learn of the death of William Morrissey of Milburn Lot 40 which occurred at Uxva on his way home from the West. Deceased went to Western Canada in the month of August on the harvest excursion. He became ill of what proved to be typhoid fever and turned towards home. But when he reached Ottawa death overtook him. His body came to Charlottetown on Saturday night and was forwarded to his late home on Monday. Deceased leaves to mourn a large family who will have the sympathy of the country in their sore bereavement. The cruiser Niobe will sail for England from Halifax at the end of November, and the officers and crew are glad at the prospect of getting out of the dry dock, where the cruiser has been for about a year. The Niobe would have sailed early in November had it not been for the delay in casting the rudder at Maxin's, England. A rudder was cast, but on the admiralty list it was rejected. Another casting had to be made, on which the cast was not taken place. It is said that failure to pass such a test is very rare, and the sailors think it is not at all remarkable that this reverse, like others, should come to the weeping Niobe. Dr Thomas Quirk and William Grey were killed in a motor accident in Calgary, the other day. The auto in which they were riding came in contact with a watering cart. The driver of the cart has been arrested for man slaughter; he admits he was on the wrong side of the road. In Philadelphia on Friday night last, three auto came into collision on a bridge resulting in the death of eight men. In an automobile race at Wauwatosa on Saturday two men were seriously injured. Six persons are dead, as the result of a collision between an automobile and a street car at Fort Worth Texas on Sunday night last. It will thus be seen that aeroplanes and automobiles are playing havoc with human life. Minard's Liniment cured Neuralgia.

Potato Prices In New Brunswick

Newcastle, N. B., Oct 5.—Small quantities of potatoes are being delivered in Newcastle by neighboring farmers at \$1.25 per barrel. The report of 80 cents cannot be verified. None seem available now in the country districts at less than \$1. In spite of the bad effect of wet weather on low land potatoes, the whole crop is better than last year, but the last few years were not average crops. Potatoes last winter and spring went up to \$2 and \$3 and there is a tendency among farmers to hold their stock for stiff prices. One farmer up river, declares he will sell none under \$1.50. He relies on crop failure in the West to make brisk demand for our potatoes there. However the agricultural society's suggestion that its members do not sell under \$1.25 was not adopted at their meeting here this week. Last fall at this time much potatoes were sold here at \$1, and the general price delivered at Chatham was \$1.10. The influence of agricultural societies is to strengthen the market.





Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations.

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader. Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra. A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchase homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00. W. W. CORY, Deputy of the Minister of the Interior.


