Reciprocity.

We republish in this issue an article on Reciprocity which appeared in The People. It will be observed that the writer is of opinion that it is of little importance to Newfoundland whether Canada gets reciprocity with the States, or whether Newfoundland gets it. The writer assumes that Newfoundland can—each and every fish cheaper than any other country, and that as Nova Scotia already buys 100,000 quintals a year from Newfoundland, the enhanced price that would result to Nova Scotian exporters would tend to force up the price of their purchases in Newfoundland. It seems to be a fact that our Newfoundland bankers on the South Coast have done much better in catching fish than the bankers from Lunenburg and Gloucester, owing probably to the better facilities they enjoy in obtaining men for the fishery and in obtaining bait to catch fish. The latter advantage has resulted in the success they have achieved in recent years in the voyages they pay to the banks of the Labrador late in the summer and in the early fall when the stormy season which prevails on Grand Bank handicaps fishing there.

Seventy Dollars Stolen

On Sunday week the sum of \$70 was stolen from the residence of an old couple named McPherson, living at Port au Port. The man and his wife locked up their home and went to prayers leaving the key hanging on a nail behind the door. The thief took it down, ransacked the house and stole the sum named from a trunk in the room. There was a deal of other money about but the marauders did not come across it. Rev. Dr. Cowperthwaite Retires From Labor.
Last night the Rev. Dr. Cowperthwaite brought his official labors in the Methodist Ministry to a close. At the Gower Street Methodist Church the reverend doctor delivered some few valedictory words. He pointed out that he landed in St. John's 23 years ago last Saturday. It was an interesting coincidence that on the 23rd anniversary of his landing, the sloop Bonavista, by which he voyaged, was in port, and he visited her, and whilst on her deck reviewed in his mind the events of his ministry. When he came to St. John's he had already spent 29 years in ministerial labors. Half a century ago he entered the ministry under the superintendency of the Rev. Richard Smith, who died last year at the goodly age of 90. At that time there was one conference for the Maritime Provinces, which also took in Newfoundland and Bermuda. His first circuit was the Sussex Vale Circuit, with boundaries some 70 miles by 10, and during those 29 years he covered Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island.
