## Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.

ALBANY, August 13.  
William Sulzer, Governor of New York, was impeached by the Lower House of Legislature at 5.16 this morning, after an all night session, by a vote of 79 to 45, on charges of having diverted campaign contributions to his own private use, and having made, under oath, false statements as to his campaign receipts. An eleven hour declaration on the part of the Governor's wife, that she had diverted some of his campaign contributions to purchase stock because she felt the household needed money, failed to avert the impeachment. A committee was appointed to acquit the Senate with the Assembly's finding, and a meeting of the Senate is scheduled for 11 o'clock this morning. The majority leaders asserted "the belief" that with the presentation to the Senate of the articles of impeachment, William Sulzer would automatically cease to be Governor, and Martin H. Glynn, Lieut. Governor, would assume his office and the functions of acting Governor. Sulzer's lawyers entertained a different view. In the light of the revelations contained in Mrs. Sulzer's declaration, the Governor's friends are inclined to view the ordeal which confronts him, with less apprehension than before the impeachment. By her assertion that she diverted part of the campaign contributions sent her husband without his knowledge, and used them to purchase stock on Wall Street, she has shorn the articles of impeachment of many of their terrors. His friends declare that the Governor consented to permit Mrs. Sulzer's declaration to become public last night only when he found he could not prevent it, and that it lived as a rumor on the lips of every member of the Assembly in the city.

VIENNA, August 13.  
It is said that finding no support from the other Powers, both Russia and Austria have abandoned their intentions of demanding a revision of the Bucharest treaty. It is rumored this change of policy, which is attributed to the German Empire's influence and to the refusal of France to support Russia, will involve the fall of Count Leopold von Berchtold, the Austrian Foreign Minister.

TOKIO, August 13.  
The Japanese press commencing upon the Japanese request to Mexico, to postpone the visit of General Felix Diaz, on account of the absence of the Emperor at Nikko, expresses the opinion that it was feared the visit might prove embarrassing, as it was liable to be made the basis for an anti-American demonstration, and for this reason the visit was put off.

Port Rexton and Trinity East have so far played three matches, our boys coming off victorious in two of the contests, and losing the other one by a narrow margin. Another exciting match is contemplated to take place in the near future. We understand Bonavista is trying conclusions with Trinity next Wednesday at the latter named place.

Just about four or five years ago, or we should be nearer the mark if we say five, Sir E. P. Morris, speaking at a political meeting here, promised the people to dredge their harbor. Sir Edward's talk has not materialized as yet. A solid vote will be polled against the Morris Government this fall in Port Rexton.

We understand one of our popular young men teachers, Mr. J. Plovman, has resigned his school at Hermitage, and will shortly proceed to try his fortune in Canada. "Jack" is very popular with everyone. We wish him bon voyage and success.

T. A. & B. PICNIC.


