The Kaiser's War Train

One of the many American war correspondents now with the German Army recently sent to his paper an interesting description of the special "War train" in which the Kaiser travels when moving along to

different parts of his armies. The train consists of seven coaches. which have armoured roofs as protec-

tion against air bombs. One of these coaches is specially de voted to maps, of which there are over 700, so fixed on rollers that any one can be quickly unrolled and studied. These maps are all war maps on a probably nine-tenths of the cases of very big scale, so that any particular stomach trouble from which people part of the front can be seen magnified. 
