Among the heroes I have known belongs a girl who once worked in a house where she was a very hard-working girl. She earned every cent of her wages twice over, if the average maid be taken as a basis of comparison, and how do you think she spent those hard-earned dollars?

One-half of her money every week went to support her father and—not her mother—but a step-mother married against her wishes and a time when the father was unable to fully support himself.

Her sister, who was also a house-keeper, gave up the same proportion of her wages.

And Yet The Father Isn't Grateful  
 Are the father and stepmother properly grateful, you may wonder? The stepmother is, but the father is not. On the contrary. And thereby hangs my tale.

I asked Margaret one day why she did not buy a hat which she told me she admired.

"It's such a cold winter," she answered, "and it costs so much to heat a house."

"I don't see why that should bother you," I said.

And then she told me (she had never mentioned her sacrifice before) about her father and step-mother. "And this winter," she explained, "has been so cold that I have had to give them extra money for wood."

"I expressed my sympathy. She sighed a little. 'I don't like to be complaining,' she said; 'but if father

only would bestir himself a little, he could get plenty of wood. They're tearing down an old schoolhouse and building a new one right near him and they let the people who want to come and pick up wood."

Being ashamed of the wrong things is a leak in character efficiency. Shame is a big force when you are ashamed of the right things. To be ashamed of the wrong things is to misdirect it and make it worse than futile.

The daughter of an acquaintance of mine, a girl who had never done anything more strenuous before than help her mother direct the maid, took a business position recently. She is engaged to be married, and probably wanted to earn some extra money for her trousseau. But instead of advancing that simple explanation: "Margaret is doing a little work in town this winter. She simply couldn't stand the wind out here another winter. You know we live on a hill where it's fearfully windy, and it makes her so nervous."

Evidently these two were ashamed of the fact that, for the first time in her life, the girl was making herself really useful. They had never been ashamed of the fact that she had been a parasite, an extra burden for an overworked father. Oh no, the thing

they were ashamed of was that she was at last doing some honest work.

Religious feeling, tenderness toward one's loved ones, work, especially the honest kind done with the hands, civility toward women, scholastic success, these are examples of the kind of things many of us are ashamed of.

### War Loan Salaries.

Expected Similar Scheme for M.P.'s.

The movement for the payment of part wages in War Loan, which began with the Cabinet, is expected to spread to M.P.'s. There is a hostility among bankers to know how far the movement is likely to go. "It is a compulsory loan," said the manager of a large bank yesterday.

"I wish the Government would take a quarter of my income and keep it for me until the end of the war," said a middle-class man. "It might mean a smaller house and one servant less, no cigars, no theatres, and possibly no motor-car. I am certain that nothing will reduce my household and personal expenses except the fact that I have not got the money to spend. I am sure others agree with me."

Mr. Arthur Chamberlain, chairman of Kynochs, Ltd., said: "I think a regular reduction would only be agreed to by those who are not already spending up to their full salary."

Sir Thomas Shann, a former Lord Mayor of Manchester, said: "I think it would be a good thing for the work-people if part salaries were paid in War Loan. They might not care much for it now, but they would realize the benefits later when they will have more need of the money."

Ministers, it is stated, have agreed to receive a quarter of their salary in War Loans.

Mr. Arthur Balfour, Vice-President of the Sheffield Chamber of Commerce: "Unless made compulsory the workers would never agree to it. But it would be a very good plan if made compulsory."

**Offered Loan of \$500,000 to New York City.**

New York, March 25.—The story of an offer of a \$500,000,000 loan to New York City to enable it to build municipal-owned subways was told the Thompson Legislative committee today by William B. Ellison, ex-corporation counsel.

The loan was to be used not only for subway construction, but also for water improvement.

Ellison said two men connected with the Standard Oil Company—Dr. Pollock and a Mr. Alexander—came to him in August, 1911, while the matter of the subway construction was pending, and asked to be presented to Mayor Gaynor.

Their offer was to furnish the sum mentioned, taking as security a lien on the subways, and a commission of 10 to 15 per cent as the work went along.

Mayor Gaynor, Mr. Ellison said, did not seem to regard the offer seriously.
