### Solid as the Continent.

#### JUSTLY DESCRIBES THE POSITION OF THE NORTH AMERICAN LIFE.

### Rev. Dr. Bond's Lecture

The lecture of Rev. Dr. Bond on that most interesting subject: "With the British Forces in Palestine" took place in the lecture room of Cochrane Street Centennial Church last night, and was attended by an audience which appreciated to the fullest extent the excellent and inspiring discourse. The Holy Land is not unfamiliar ground to the learned lecturer and his description of the scenes and places were most illustrative. Reference was made particularly to the marvellous campaign which culminated in the entry of the composite British forces, led by General Allenby into Jerusalem on December 11th, 1917, this date by a remarkable coincidence, being the 400th anniversary of the Holy City's capture by the Turks in 1517. The lecturer emphasized the importance of the restoration of the City of David to the Cross, and paid a tribute to the skill of the British engineers in overcoming difficulties of route without which the march from Egypt to Palestine would have been impossible. Their great triumph was the victory of mind over matter, causing the hitherto unconquered desert to bear across his wastes the abundant waters of health and healing. Dr. Bond said that the kaleidoscopic events of the past three years had almost obscured this marvellous feat, yet the valour, sacrifices, unflinching and faithful services which made the peaceful and orderly capture of the holy places possible would yet shine brilliantly forth to the world, Jams Ryan to the Orphanage, and in this light the army engineers


will have first place. The reverend lecturer unfolded in brief the story of Jerusalem whose history bridges at least 3,500 years. Jerusalem inseparable from the Jews, had been long crushed beneath the heel of the unspeakable Turk. Where Richard of the Lion Heart had failed, Allenby had succeeded. The holy places had been wrested from the hand of the infidel, and the City of David would once again become the home of the chosen people, and who could say what the passing of years may bring. The entrance of Allenby through the "Gate of the Friend," may mark the dawn of an end fraught with immeasurable benefits to the religious life of the world.

The lecture was illustrated with pictures, and as scene after scene was shown on the sheet the audience gazed with reverence, and may we say with heart thrillings also, on the hills, valleys, churches, temples and villages, on walls and houses.

The customary vote of thanks to the lecturer for his inspiring theme was not tendered owing to the talented gentleman's call for the National Anthem before the opportunity to express the gratitude of the audience offered, but Dr. Bond took with him the sincere, if not the formal, thanks of every one of his hearers.


