Whitty Case Dismissed.

JUDGEMENT FOR MAYOR AND COUNCIL

The case of E. J. Whitty vs. the Mayor and City Council for arrears of wages was dismissed by Judge Morris yesterday afternoon.

A great deal of interest had been manifested in this case which was a test to decide whether the Council was justified in reducing the wages of men employed on Relief Works. After Mr. Ayre had concluded his lengthy address His Honor summed up as follows:—

"From the evidence submitted in this case the following facts appear. The Municipal Council decided to do certain work within the city limits, and instructed the city engineer to proceed with the work. Men were employed to do this work, at first, to the number of eighty men, and the plaintiff was employed as foreman. The wages agreed upon were thirty three cents, the foreman receiving two cents an hour more by reason of his position. The men had been working between two and three weeks when the Council decided to reduce the rate of wages and to this effect they instructed the Secretary, Mr. Mahoney. The plaintiff, on the 23rd of May, received a notice, notifying him that beginning Thursday, the 26th May, the pay for the work would be at the rate of \$2.50 per day or 25c. per hour of a ten hour day. At the end of the week the plaintiff was paid at the rate of \$3.50 per day or 35c. per hour plus two cents an hour as foreman.

The Council was strictly within its rights in reducing the rate of wages of its employees, as it also had the right to employ or discharge the men. The evidence of the Premier, Mr. Bennett and Mr. Higgins, given in the case, had no bearing on the work done at Golf Avenue, on which the plaintiff was employed, but referred to work outside the City limits. East and West, and undertaken jointly by the members of the Legislature for St. John's and the Municipal Council."

The plaintiff's claim is dismissed.

Civic Commission.

WEEKLY MEETING.

The weekly meeting of the Municipal Council was held at 8.30 p.m. on Thursday, Mayor Gosling presided, and Councillors Ayre, Morris, Peet, Vinicombe and Jackman were present. After the Minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed, the following matters were disposed of.

A communication was received from Inspector General Hutchings, stating he had no objection to permission being given the Department of Marine and Fisheries for the erection of a shed on the King's wharf, for the purpose of an Acetylene Compressing Plant.

The Deputy Minister of Public Works asked that attention be given the street fronting Departmental building. This was referred to the City Engineer.

Nld. Furniture and Bedding Company asked extension of time for payment of City Taxes. Request cannot be acceded to, as the Council considers the first duty of citizens is to pay taxes due the city.

The Hon. Secretary, Child Welfare Association, asked permission to hold concerts in Bannerman Park, dates of which will be arranged with the Bandmasters of the different brigades. This request was acceded to.

Walter Carl, Quidi Vidi Road, asked that the new houses in this locality be numbered; also that street light be given attention. Both matters will be attended to.

Wm. Tulk, Geo. Pike and others, New St., off Quidi Vidi Road, asked that this street be named and houses numbered, as the residents are at present subject to considerable inconvenience, owing to lack of same. At their request, it was decided that the street be given the name of "Carroll Avenue."

A. N. Harbin asked attention be given the water tank, Clifford St. The matter was referred to the Sanitary Supervisor.

Application of Francis Chaytor to cover roof of building, corner Waldegrave and George Streets, with rubberoid so as to make same tenable, was referred to the City Engineer.

A letter was read from the Secretary, Sergeant's Mess, Royal Nld. Regiment, in connection with the Memorial to be erected in Garrison Park, asking the co-operation of the Council in putting the park in suitable condition. Council will place a curb and gutter along the park, and the matter of railing, lighting, etc., was referred to the Engineer for consideration.

Plan, submitted by E. Tucker, for alterations to building, Holdsworth St., was passed, subject to the approval of the City Engineer. Application of J. Doyle to repair dwelling, Military Road, was acceded to.

Inspector Rooney reported on houses situated on Casey St., between Brazil's Square and Charlton Street, not having water and sewerage connections. The owners are to be notified to have same installed.

It was ordered Waterford Bridge Road be prepared for oiling, and owners of autos, cabs, trucks, etc., requested not to use this road, while work is being done.

City Engineer reported on the work done during the past week, relaying of water mains; repairing of storm sewers, etc.

Report of City Health Officer showed five new cases of Diphtheria in the city for the past week.

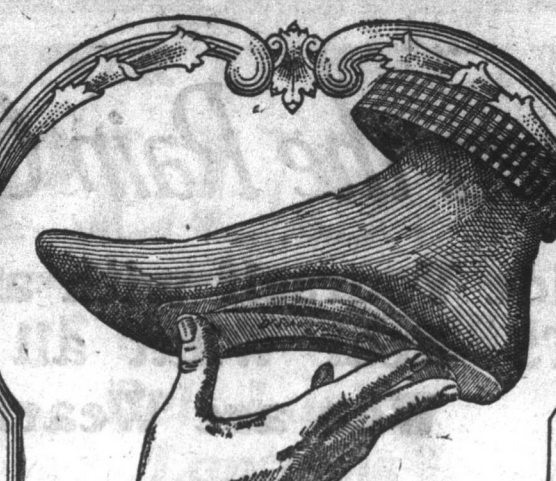
After passing the payrolls and bills the meeting adjourned.
