## Russia to Assist Germany Against France.

### Stinnes Cancels Contracts -- 2200 Newfoundlanders Affected.

### France Wants 100,000 Troops Augmented -- Canadian Minister Dies Suddenly -- Lloyd George's Return to Power Predicted.

PARIS, Jan. 17. (Dusseldorf correspondent) The British Commission will sail from New York on Saturday.

It is asserted here that the difficulties the French are encountering in Ruhr have led to the differences between Premier Poincare and Marshal Poch, the Marshal having demanded more troops owing to the unexpected resistance by the industrial magnates, and that if Poch is successful in his demand the French advance will be one of military conquest.

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### MUSSOLINI WATCHING EVENTS.

ROME, Jan. 17. Premier Mussolini, who had arranged to visit Sicily, Calabria and the Province of Potenza, the stronghold of former Premier Nitti, has postponed his journey owing to the gravity of the international situation which he considers requires his presence in the capital. The Premier is closely watching the development of events in Ruhr with the constant aim of preventing complications which might lead to a renewal of hostilities. Italy is also vitally interested in the collection of the Reparations due her, which she needs as urgently as France.

### WILL WORK GERMAN FORESTS.

PARIS, Jan. 17. The French, Belgian and Italian Governments to-day gave order to immediately commence working the State forests on the left bank of the Rhine as a penalty for Germany's default, of delivery of timber, as established by the decision of the Reparations Commission on Dec. 26th.

### A WAY OUT.

LONDON, Jan. 17. A resolution advocating a moratorium for Germany for an agreed number of years, the immediate fixing of the Reparations at a sum which that country would pay within a reasonable period, and some form of international loan to her, was carried by the Association of the British Chamber of Commerce to-day.

### NOVA SCOTIA MINERS MUST CHOOSE.

INDIANAPOLIS, Jan. 17. Notice has been served on the coal miners of Nova Scotia by the International Executive Board of the United Mine Workers of America that they cannot affiliate with the Red International Labor Organization of Moscow and at the same time remain members of the United Mine Workers. It was announced here to-day. The United Mine Workers by this step it was declared, have put themselves directly on record against the radicals who are endeavoring, with Russian examples, "to destroy the American labor movement and substitute there for the principles of Bolshevism." In case the Canadian Local Union concerned attempts to proceed further with their affiliation efforts the Union's leadership has decided to revoke their present power of controlling their own local organization and set up a new one in the territory as was done in Kansas two years ago.

### REACHED A DEADLOCK.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17. The British and American Debt Commissions have reached a point in negotiations where it is virtually agreed that no further progress can be made.

## The Perfect Cavalier of Spain.

El Cid was the popular name of a Spanish national hero, born about 1040, he had a career as a "soldier of fortune," which, idealized by tradition, has made El Cid the perfect cavalier of Spain. He first appears in national history when Sancho, the oldest son of Ferdinand I, and King of Castile, was at war with his brother Alfonso. At this time El Cid was already known as the camped or champion, a name which he won probably by vanquishing in single combat, the champion of Sancho of Navarre.

According to history, El Cid went to the city of Valencia in command of an expedition after King Alfonso, under whose protection the city had been, was defeated in battle by the Almoravides, a new Moslem sect from North Africa. The Cid's expedition proved successful, and he established himself in Valencian territory, and finally became master of Valencia itself. He successfully held the city until 1099, when the troops he had sent against the Almoravides were utterly routed. He, already enfeebled in health, died, it is said, of grief and shame.

## Guards Victorious Over St. Bon's.

FAIR EXHIBITION OF HOCKEY.

The opening hockey game of the Newfoundland Hockey Association was played at the Prince's Rink last night between the St. Bon's and Guards teams, before an attendance of twenty-two hundred fans, and resulted in a win for the Guards by the very close margin of 5 goals to 3.

The game, from a spectator's standpoint did not show up to expectations, the players at times appeared to be very much at sea, and the brand of hockey cannot be considered good, and only at intervals were the old time flashes of snappy play noticeable. On the other hand, the condition of the ice must be taken into consideration: the surface was not conducive to good hockey by any means, and the players faults must be overlooked for the present. On good ice the play would very likely have been somewhat different, however the players did not keep their positions and the shooting was erratic. Referee Tobin had his hands full on numerous occasions, in checking the players, and the penalty box was well decorated with players of both teams, for infringements of the rules, though the offences committed were only of a minor nature.

### THE GAME.


Referee Tobin called the players promptly together at 7:30. Both teams were greeted with a hearty reception as they appeared on the ice. The Guards players looked very neat in their new uniforms of blue and white, while the St. Bon's appeared in their regular uniforms as worn last season. The fans and supporters of the respective teams occupied places of advantage in the enclosure. The teams faced off at 7:40; after the game had been a few minutes under way, his Excellency the Governor and Suite arrived. The party were received by Mr. Angus Reid, President of the Rink, and P. E. Osterbridge, the Secy-Treasurer, and were escorted to the Director's Box in the gallery. The match was temporarily halted while the National Anthem was being played. The game was then resumed and saw the puck confined to the Guards territory; Callahan and Keegan made two unsuccessful attempts to score, Volsey cleared in the style. Robertson took control of the rubber, but was frustrated from scoring by the St. Bon's defence. Callahan recovered the disc and placed a well directed shot but Halley was unobtainable. Callahan was ordered to the bench a minute later for tripping. The honors for the first half of the period were equally divided, the forwards of both teams made several attacks on goal, but no scoring resulted. Phelan for St. Bon's and Robertson for the Guards made several individual rushes but nothing materialized. It was not until sixteen minutes of the first period had elapsed when Callahan began individual effort from mid-ice broke away on his lonesome and by slipping inside of the St. Bon's defence, passed over to Wm. Clouston who scored the first goal for the season. The cheers had hardly died away when Gordon Halley took charge of the disc and by clever stick-handling dashed through the Guards lines, made a perfect pass to Jack Higgins, who was now substituting Muir, Higgins scoring the equalizer. The play towards the end of the period was of a give and take nature; shot upon shot was rained at both goal-keepers but the shooting was very poor. Eddie Phelan who was playing a good game from the very outset made a pretty dash, but a good chance was lost when he passed the puck over to the left, and the puck was snuffed. Just before the gong went Callahan made a good run down the ice and passed the disc to Clouston, who safely lodged it in the corner of the net, just as the gong sounded, the goal net counting. End of first period, Guards 1 goal, St. Bon's 0.
