Anthracite Miners to Meet
Governor Pinchot To-day

Carl Voss of Gloucester Arrested for Piracy—Irish Elections Begin To-day—
Turkish Soldiers Reported to have Fired on U.S.A. Flag.

GVERNOR PINCHOT TRIES HARD
TO AVERT STRIKE.

HARRISBURG, Pa., Aug. 26. Efforts to meet him in Harrisburg Monday at noon were sent Governor Pinchot to-day to four representatives of the anthracite miners and four members of the operating policy committee, who have been taking part in recent negotiations as the first step in his efforts to settle the differences between the miners and the anthracite industry.

IRISH ELECTIONS TO-DAY.

DUBLIN, Aug. 26. The first general election in the Free State, which will be held tomorrow, will mark the close of a contest that has been unusually quiet and peaceful; the only feature has been the arrest of a leader of the DeValera, the Republican leader who seeks to overthrow the Free State and the Treaty of 1921.

ARRESTED FOR PIRACY.

BEVERLY, Mass., Aug. 26. Carl Voss of Gloucester was arrested yesterday on a warrant issued by the Gloucester Police, charged with piracy on the high seas.

BOMBING RIOTS IN INDIA.

SIMLA, India, Aug. 26. Bombing riots, resulting in a number of casualties and much property

destruction, occurred on Friday, at Saharnpur and Gonda, in the United Provinces at the close of Muharram religious celebrations. The police quelled the rioters by the use of fire arms and the situation was brought under control.

IRISH REPUBLICAN AGENT SHOT
BY FREE STATE TROOPS.

BELFAST, Aug. 26. Edward Kelly, one of the Republicans who the Free State authorities have been hunting, was shot and critically injured by the Government troops here to-day in Ballykerry District of County Monaghan. Kelly and a companion who were captured unharmed, are said to have been engaged in posting Republican literature. The authorities declared that a large quantity of such literature, including documents from Attika, the Republican Chief of Staff, were found in their possession.

GERMANY HAS SPOKEN FRANCE
HAS THE FLOOR.

BERLIN, Aug. 24. Approval of Chancellor Stresemann's latest expression on the reparations issue is voiced to-day by the press of all parties. The Nationalist editors lay stress upon the emphatic manner in which the Chancellor rejected any compromise with regard to Germany's sovereignty over the Rhineland, while Socialist organs think the Chancellor displayed laudable sincerity in dealing with the issue. Chancellor Stresemann's speech, says the Deutsche Allgemeine Zeitung, the organ of Hugo Stinnes, marks a distinct progress in that it makes clear to the world points of difference existing in the way of France and Germany look at the question. It goes straight to the crux of the whole issue, says the newspaper. Does France want reparations or the Rhine? Germany has spoken and France now has the floor.

TREATY OF ALGERIANS TO FOLLOW
TREATY OF SEVRES.

LONDON, Aug. 25. Under Tanager and other date lines, London newspapers to-night print reports of Spanish losses and difficulties in Morocco. The Tanager correspondent of the Daily Express quotes a Riffian communication on the fighting previous to the relief of Tifariti as saying that the rebels counted 739 Spanish dead, while it took them two days to remove the enemy's wounded. Abdelkrim, the rebel leader, a week ago summoned 100,000 Riffians to arms and threatened to confiscate goods and lands of all who disobeyed the call. The French zone and Tanager itself is practically denuded of Riffians in consequence of the general response to the summons. Abdelkrim has issued a manifesto, the despatch adds, declaring the Treaty of Algerias must go the same way as the Treaty of Sevres, for his people are capable of governing themselves, and like the Turks, are prepared to prove they are able to prove their determination.

CONVICT GOES FREE.

COLUMBUS, O., Aug. 25. Butler R. Stork, 31, a convicted forger, donned civilian clothes this morning, preparatory to stepping out of the Ohio Penitentiary into a position that will now pay him \$250 a month. Sentenced to serve two years, Stork, after 21 months, has been granted conditional parole. The condition is that he follow the work he instituted among his fellow prisoners and in which more than 1,800 are now interested. Stork, a college graduate, and a former army captain, is the originator of the correspondence school in which convicts have been given an opportunity to educate themselves.

SENSATIONAL REPORT.

ATHENS, Aug. 25. A telegram from the Island of Imbros, reports that a launch flying the United States flag and carrying refugees, was fired upon by Turkish

soldiers at Gallipoli, one man being killed and a woman badly injured.

CANADIAN NATIONAL EXHIBITION
OPENS AT TORONTO.

TORONTO, Aug. 26. The Canadian National Exhibition, Toronto's big annual fair, was opened for its forty-fifth annual showing yesterday, when Dr. F. C. Banting, discoverer of diabetes insulin who became internationally famous during the year since the last fair, pressed the switch button that officially opened the exhibition to the public to-day. It was warriors' day according to the programme and returned soldiers with their dependents, were the guests of the directorate. Officials are aiming at an attendance of a million and a half people during the two weeks of the fair this year.

NEW CABLE BEING LAID ACROSS
THE ATLANTIC.

NEW YORK, Aug. 26. Huge drums at Far-Rockaway workshops of the Commercial Cable Company, began uncoiling the eighth cable across the Atlantic this morning. This latest communication with Europe will run under the Atlantic, a total distance of 4,000 miles, by way of Nova Scotia and the Azores, to LaHave, France.

DISEASE GERMS LURKING IN DISINFECTED BRUSH.

Anthrax infection lurking in the hair of a shaving brush caused the death of Arthur Herbert Dennison, warehouseman, of Bradford. A coroner's jury, in coming to this conclusion, considered that the disease was contracted through the hair of the brush coming into contact with a cut upon the face. Whether it was due to some defect in the disinfection of the hair or accidental presence of anthrax bacilli in the hair, they added, there was no evidence to show. The hair was traced to the importers, who got it under guarantee that it had been disinfected.
