

Market News

(Trade Review)
 There has been no change in local markets since last week. During the week several arrivals of fish, but mostly from Labrador, but the weather very little was landed along the waterfront, and some of labour given was nothing to beget at the price ruling last week when the highest catchable was quoted at \$5.00 to \$6.00, and some small lots of extra superior quality of fish were sold at \$6.50. Most of those in the market it is impossible for fish to be sold at the \$7.00 mark with the foreign market as they are, and many expect a decline in the price of Shore fish. The short catch of Shore fish may tend to keep Labrador still at the same figure \$4.00 per quintal, and many dealers would not be moved, if, owing to the competition in the European centers there was a considerable decline in price. The following were cleared during the week:—Silvia 2,000 qtls., 2,600 qtls., 2,000 qtls., Ingrid, 2,722 qtls., Oporto, Monroe Export Co.; Roy Moore, 4,000 qtls., Seville, B. Barnero; Little Bay, 5,200 qtls., Seville, B. Barnero; Dazle, 3,100 qtls., Labrador, 2,000 qtls., salt bulk, Renewes, 2,000 qtls., S. Thibo, 3,148 qtls., 1,623 qtls. from G. W. West. The Rosalind took 10,056 qtls. to New York for transhipment to Greece, and B.W.I. while 3,800 qtls. went to the U.S. market. The ship also took a large shipment and exports for the week were the 1,023 qtls. Herring shipped by S. & Sons, and Alembic with 298 qtls. of Cod Oil for New York shipped by S. & Sons.
 Cod Liver Oil shows a very healthy condition which is usual at this season when the drug trade are putting their prescriptions for winter sale. There has been so few refiners to Newfoundland that if it were for one or two firms this industry would be wholly neglected. When glowing reports were received from Dr. Silva it was hoped that the Government would assist in every way to keep this industry moving, but as if Newfoundland were the only country in the world where this oil was obtained and we can force prices on what prices we like.
 Common Cod Oil—Foreign market retained a firm tone owing to the reports received from Newfoundland where the production is not less than half of normal. The market for crude Menhaden oil advanced in the United States and this shows a healthy tone. The market took 31 tons cod oil to New York.
 Large shipments of this article reach each by each steamer from Canada and by the Manoa, Canadian Sapper and Canadian Beaver. During the week approximately 23,000 barrels were loaded, all purchased for October and November dealing. We understand that shipments of December dealing will be a little easier and will show a decline of 5 cents per barrel, but the market on the whole is firm, and there is considerable activity in buying and selling, and business generally shows much improvement all around in flour and kindred lines. The imports for the week were:—Beaver, 9,230 bris.; Beaver, 6,349 bris.; Sable I, 2,550 bris.; Silvia 1,357 bris.; and Manoa 9,750 bris. The figures for the week were \$7.30 to \$8.30 per barrel wholesale.
 The demand, which we noted last week, still prevails in Durban showing no sign of diminution, so that the market remains firm and there is no probability of lower prices, certainly they will not drop for some time to come. The Scandinavian countries and Germany still continue to order heavily and packers in the United States are up against it to fill all the demands made on them. Back Pork particularly, say dealers, is exceptionally scarce and the figures quoted for this grade of goods are now about \$1.50 per barrel more than it was a few weeks ago, and the price is for a still higher figure in the near future. Pork quotations in the local market this week are:—Fat Back, \$30.00 per brl. wholesale; S.C. Bacon, \$30.00; Bacon, \$27.00; Ham Butt, \$29.00, and Spare Ribs, \$30.00. The imports for the week were:—By Digby from Halifax 865 bris.; Canadian Sapper 395 bris.; Silvia 540 bris., and Manoa 210 bris., a total of 1,510 bris.

the market will assuredly advance as a result. Packers of the goods cannot very well cope with orders assigned to them and the local market, which is by no means overstocked with meat remains strong with the possibility of sharp advances over present-day figures shortly. The figures quoted this week are: Bos. Flank med. \$26.50 per brl. wholesale and Family Special \$22.00. This weeks Imports were:—x Digby 1015 bris., Sable I, 371 bris., and Silvia 546 bris., an aggregate of 2332 barrels.

Sugar—Dealers particularly interested in this market, and who keenly note its every phase, incline to the belief that the market shows indubitable signs of weakening and will soon be definitely on the down grade. As a matter of fact prices at the present writing are about 10 cents less than recent quotation with a tendency to still lower figures later. The sugar crop which will be harvested this month, we understand will yield almost 4,000,000 tons and is a good deal in excess of last years output. The big crop has much to do with the slump in prices, but other contributing features are, the close of the year, serving and jamming season, and the curtailment of indulgence in soft drinks owing to the approach of the cold weather. Granulated sugar in barrels was quoted during this week at \$10.70 wholesale. The imports for the week were, per Silvia, 2970 cwt.

Ten—We are now pretty well supplied with all the stock of tea we require for the winter. There is little or no change in the market and the prices quoted recently vary according to grade, from 94 cents, to 48c., 55c., 60c., and 67c., to 80c. for the very best goods wholesale. The demand is fair and importers do not expect much change in prices, in the local market for some time. The imports this week were 2550 lbs, by the Silvia from New York.

Lobsters—To dispose of the seasons pack an order received recently most of the goods held here were shipped to England by various characters and the holdings here are now very slight. The shipment made was 500 cases and most of the goods were shipped to England, where they have been of late in fair demand, while some went to Greece, Germany and Holland as well as France formerly good customers for our lobsters, this season failed us completely and the best price that could be obtained in the British market was \$20.00 per case a decline of between \$5.00 and \$7.00 as compared with the figures quoted when the first shipment of this years pack came the way. The lobster fishery will soon be in a precarious position unless greater attention is given it by the fishery authorities and others interested.

Hay and Oats—There is noticeable a slight demand for these goods of late and considerable stocks are being imported mostly from Canada by the various steamers plying to this port. Black oats (3 bus. sacks) are quoted at \$2.50; white, (4 bus. sacks) \$3.60, mixe \$3.35. Considerable consignments of hay are being received also and the price in the local market is \$7 the long ton. The imports of oats this week were by the Canadian Sapper 3795 bushels, Manoa 14,000 bushels, and by the Canadian Beaver 15,500 bushels a total of 33,295 bushels. The hay imports for the week were by the Canadian Beaver 2324 bales, Manoa 1787 bales a total of 4111 bales.

The miscellaneous imports for the week were 250 cwts. butter, 267 cwts. cheese, 690 bris. potatoes, 515 pkcs. catmeal, 121 horned cattle, 92 sheep, 2900 lbs. tobacco, 50 casks kerosene, 150 bxs. soap, 3050 sacks corn meal, and 1300 bris. cement.

Nature's Champion Bluffer

Although the horn-toad, specimens of which have recently reached this country, is one of the most repulsive and formidable-looking of all creatures, it is in reality quite harmless.

No animal is as more thorough "bluffer." It can inflate its skin to twice its normal size, presenting an appearance of extreme ferocity. When it is angry it hisses and rattles its tail, while it is further endowed with the astonishing gift of squirting blood from its eyes. Actually, however, the horn-toad is an incapable of inflicting injury as the ordinary garden frog.

Its ability to emit blood from its eyes without damage to those delicate organs has lately claimed the attention of scientists, who have discovered that the toad squirts blood as a safety valve ejects steam. When the creature is disturbed its blood pressure rises, filling with blood the tiny pockets round its eyes. As the pressure increases the walls of these pockets give way, and the blood shoots forth, frightening away its enemy.

The blood is slightly acid, and causes a certain amount of discomfort to the person or animal whose skin it touches. The horn-toad can squirt its blood fifteen inches, at intervals of from one to two minutes, and has been known to repulse even rattlesnakes by this extraordinary means.
