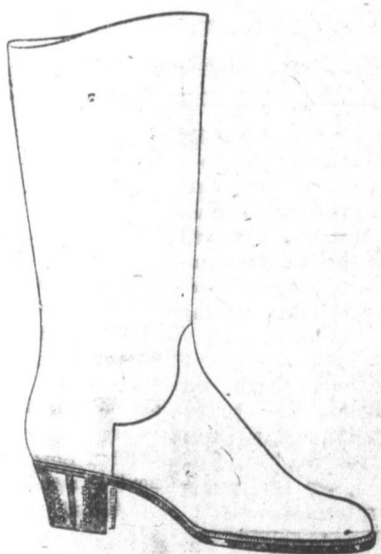

150th Anniversary Congregationalism

The week beginning next Sunday, the 18th Oct., bids fair to be a memorable one for the Queen's Road Congregational Church, as it will witness the celebrations associated with the completion of 150 years of continuous life and history. The Church was formed in 1775 through the zeal of John Jones a non-commissioned officer in the Royal Artillery, then part of the garrison who was afterwards ordained in England and became the first minister. The early years were marked by opposition and persecution, while battling the dissenters at worship became a favourite sport with the rowdy elements of the town. But the courage of the little company triumphed over all hindrances and soon the Church was fairly established, and began to exercise a commanding influence in the life of St. John's.

The interests in the Anniversary proceedings will extend beyond the borders of the present congregation for in all the churches and among all sections of the community are many who have hereditary ties with the Congregational Church; few, indeed, are the older families of St. John's which cannot trace some association with it. It is to be both desired and hoped that so important an occasion in the history, not only of the Congregational Church, but also of the city itself, will be worthily observed and supported.

Agreement Reached to Relieve Listeners-in

The Minister of Posts and Telegraphs has been advised that the Canadian, British, United States Governments, as well as Newfoundland have entered into an agreement by which merchant ships of all countries after October 1st, would cease operating their wireless apparatus on the way lengths between 200 and 450 miles off coasts of Newfoundland, Canada, the United States and British Isles. The purpose is to relieve radio broadcasting from a type of interference which has been an increasing cause for complaint.

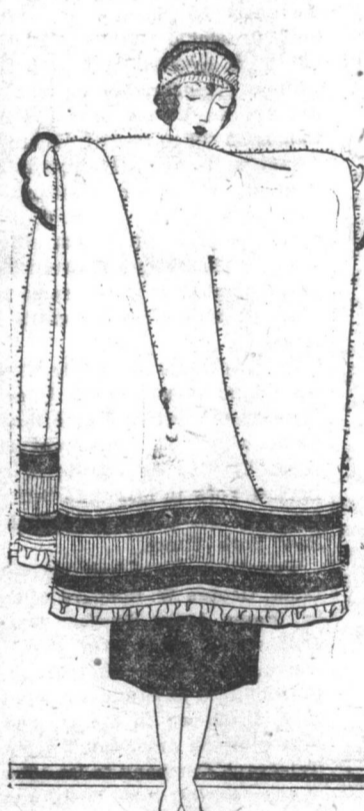
