Chisholm and Whitton, the Conservative candidates, are actively at work, but they will have to fight against great odds. Mr. Chisholm is Mayor of the city, and on this account, and because he is well known and in good standing, will make a much better run tlam his colleague, whose mane until now was scarcely ever heard in connection with polities or any public matter whatever. The Tories have evidently taken h'm up under pressure of the nine hour movement, thinking by this means that they will secure the working man's vote for himself and for Mr. Chisholm.
