## CECIL FANNING SINGS IN AL AZHAR TEMPLE TONIGHT

Greatest American Baritone Scores Distinct Success in Vancouver

The Calgary Musical Agency present the distinguished American baritone, Cecil Fanning, tonight in Al Azhar Temple, with his gifted accompanist, H. B. Turpin. This will open their series of ten concerts and will be one of the richest musical treats that our people have ever had the privilege of listening to. The program will commence promptly at 8.30, and the doors will be closed during numbers.

Cecil Fanning has made a steady rise in the world of baritone, during the last ten years, until now, at the age of thirty-one, he stands near the top, as far as his voice is concerned, and perhaps even above them all, in point of artistry and interpretation.

Dr. Arne's "Cuckoo Song" was most alluring, and Cook's "Over Hill, Over Dale" was full of frolic.
