5. Any member may enter twice in his

5. Any member may enter twice in his same "class or a higher class at his own option on payment of an extra 50 cents and making the number of shots under the rules before the time expires, and his highest score, the first or last 300 shots, will count for the prize."

6. No second entrance accepted until the first 300 shots are fired.

7. The score of the official scorer shall be final, and all shooting must be done before reliable members as referees.

8. Any disputed score to be decided by the directors.

9. The 300 shots must be fired on or be-

9. The 300 shots must be fired on or betore July 15, 1890.
