GENERALLY FAIR AND A LITTLE MILD.

Toronto, Nov. 18.—11 p.m.—The pressure has given way considerably today in the northwestern portion of the continent, and a rather important low area has centered in Southern Manitoba. The higher pressure covers the Middle Atlantic States. Light snow-falls have occurred from the Rockies east to the upper lakes region. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Calgary, 4 below 6; Qu'Appelle, 12-22; Winnipeg, 4-24; Port Arthur, 12-28; Parry Sound, 12-26; Toronto, 25-34; Ottawa, 18-24; Montreal, 20-24; Quebec, 18-24; Halifax, 25-32.

"Varsity has this to say of a well-known young Londoner, and son of Mr. Frank Love, barrister of this city. "For the last four years the halls of Varsity have known the genial face of W. D. Love, and there will be much genuine regret and deep sympathy for him among the host of friends he has made during that time, when it is learned that he has been compelled by illness to abandon his course and leave the university. For some time past he has been suffering from a severe cold, but continued to attend lectures and engaged in his usual exercise on the tennis courts. For two weeks ago, however, he found his health getting so bad that he consulted a doctor, who pronounced his trouble to be bronchial pneumonia.
