In the Dining-Room.

SATURDAY, MAY 8.

BREAKFAST—Wheatmeal, sugar and cream. Watercress. Parsley omelet. Popovers. Coffee.

LUNCHEON—Kedgeree with lettuce and French dressing. Thin-sliced bread and butter. Sliced bananas with cream. Tea.

DINNER—Corn soup. Roast of veal stuffed, horseradish. Scalloped potatoes. Radishes. Parsnips fried. Coffee jelly with whipped cream. Child's ginger wafers.

Cut out these recipes and paste them in a scrapbook.

Wheatmeal—To one quart boiling water add half teaspoonful salt, then stir in one teaspoonful wheatmeal, letting it run through the fingers slowly to prevent lumps; stir well; cook two minutes.

Corn Soup—One can of corn, one quart of milk, butter the size of an egg, one teaspoonful salt and one-fourth teaspoonful pepper, one tablespoonful cornstarch. Let the corn, with a quart of cold water, boil in a double boiler for one hour; strain through a colander; mix the butter and cornstarch together and add, with the milk, to the liquid. Let it all come to a boil and serve. The beaten white of an egg may be added just before serving, to make it lighter if desired.

Scalloped Potatoes—One-half dozen good-sized potatoes sliced raw, butter the size of an egg, a teaspoonful of chopped onion, one teaspoonful of salt and a quarter of a teaspoonful of pepper. Cover bottom of baking dish with a thick layer of potatoes, season with two of butter, onion, pepper and salt; until the dish is full. Cover with milk and bake slowly about two hours.

Coffee Jelly with Whipped Cream—Dissolve one-quarter of a box of gelatin in three tablespoonfuls of cold water; add this to two cupfuls of strong coffee (left over from breakfast) with two and one-half tablespoonfuls of sugar, put into a one-quart mold, then a layer of potatoes, and so on set in a cold place. Whip one pint of cream and pour it over before serving.

Struck by a Street Car

Mrs. McLellan, of East London, Had Her Arm Broken.

The Motorman Acted Promptly and the Car Was Brought to a Stand.

Still Just as the Collision Happened.

Mrs. J. McLellan, an elderly widow living at 69 King street, walked in front of a moving street car on Dundas street east yesterday afternoon about 3 o'clock and very narrowly escaped fatal injury.

She was crossing Dundas street, east of Adelaide, and did not notice an approaching west-bound car. The motorman sounded the gong and shouted to her. Other persons also gave the alarm, but Mrs. McLellan, who completely lost her hearing some time ago, was unconscious of her danger.

The motorman promptly put on the brakes, and just as the car was about at a standstill it struck Mrs. McLellan as she was crossing the first rail. She fell and suffered a fracture of the ulna. Bystanders carried her into Boyle's drug store, and medical aid was summoned. She was badly shaken up, but was soon able to walk home.

RAILWAY TRAINMEN.

Receipts for two years total \$13,100, and disbursements, \$11,093.60. There is now in the treasury, \$38,574. During two years four lodges have been added, making a total of 520. The total membership now is 23,332, a gain in two years of 3,201. From October, 1894, to Jan. 1, 1897, the sum of \$2,967,994 was paid out for death and total disability claims.

Tenders Called

For the New Bridge and Two Big Sewer Sections.

Time for Completion of the Whole Work Fixed at Four Months—This Means the Employment of Many Men—Another Inspector.

The special sewer committee of the council met last night and decided to call for tenders for the construction of the proposed bridge at the foot of King street and the steel pipe which it is to carry. Figures will be asked for a roadway bridge and one with a foot path only.

Ald. O'Meara asked Mr. Chipman if a 14-foot bridge was necessary for the purpose of carrying the pipe, and Mr. Chipman replied that in his opinion it was not.

Mr. Chipman pointed out that the Board of Health report, adopted last year, provided for a 26-inch pipe, while he had recommended a 30-inch pipe. The pipe will be made a size to be agreed upon by the engineers.

The new sections, "J" and "K," were then considered.

Ald. Carrolthers asked Mr. Chipman how long it should take to complete section J, which is 2,916 feet long, and an average depth of 29 feet 5 inches.

Mr. Chipman replied that, roughly estimating it, 70 or 80 men would complete both sections in four or five months.

The time for the completion of section J was fixed at four months, and section K, which is 2,400 feet long, at three months.

Tenders will be called for the two sections, to be in three weeks. The time for the completion of the bridge was made four months from June 1.

The mayor was empowered to purchase the 60 feet of property for sewerage purposes from D. Spence, Evergreen avenue. This small section will be started at once, and an inspector
