American Markets.

CHICAGO, April 23.—Heavy world's shipments; the increase of passage, sympathy with corn and liquidation combined to lower prices of wheat today, but the close was steady, 5c to 4c under Saturday. Corn closed with 4c to 4 1/2c decline, and oats a shade higher.

Provisions at the close were unchanged in land, 5c lower in ribs, and 2c to 2 1/2c reduced in pork. Receipts were 45 cars, none of contract grade. Primary receipts were 337,000 bu, compared with 584,000 bu last year. Minneapolis and Duluth reported 324 cars, against 406 last week and 600 a year ago.

The leading futures closed as follows: Wheat, No. 2 April, 64 1/2c; May, 64 1/2c; July, 64 1/2c; Sept., 64 1/2c; Corn, No. 2 April, 57 1/2c; May, 57 1/2c; July, 57 1/2c; Sept., 57 1/2c.

THE DYNAMITERS

Were Suspected of Being Burglars and Were Watched Several Days.

Niagara Falls, N. Y., April 24.—It has been discovered that the third member of the three alleged Welland Canal dynamiters, who refused to give his name to the police, registered at the Roslin House, across the river, by the name of Dullman. The two who gave their names as Walsh and Nelson first came to this city a week ago and registered at the Imperial Hotel. They remained there until Tuesday morning, when they removed their headquarters to the Dolphin. Captain Diman says he was shadowing the men, thinking them to be burglars, and had all three of them been together Saturday morning he would have taken them into custody.

The three were remained for eight days, and shackled together in charge of three officers, left on a Wabash train for Welland. Detective Murray and Chief Young accompanied the party, and a tremendous crowd was at the station to get a glimpse of them.

MAY STRIKE

Press Feeders Serve an Ultimatum on the Bosses—Cigarmakers Want More Money.

Detroit, April 24.—At a meeting of the Detroit Job Pressmen, Feeders and Assistants Union in the Trades Council building yesterday noon, it was decided to issue an ultimatum to the employers that unless the demands of the union are complied with before Wednesday noon, every member of the union will be called on to pay his dues.

It is reported that Milwaukee has expended more than \$16,000 for players this season.

The Connecticut state league has adopted a rule whereby no rain checks shall be given out after the third inning.

Kirtley Baker and John Pappalau, two ex-Western league pitchers, have joined the Springfield club of the Eastern league.

According to President Freedman, the game on April 19 was the most profitable first game the polo grounds ever saw. There were no invitations sent out, and but very few passes were issued. About 12,000 were on the grounds, and \$1,500 of them paid money to get in.
