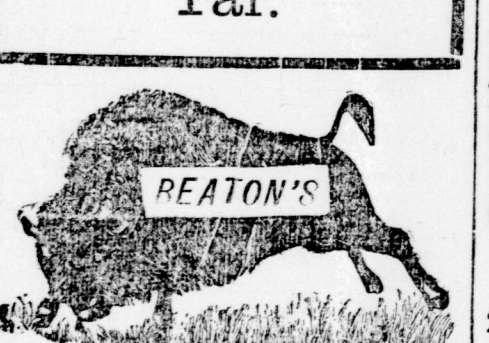

—The Young Liberal carnival on Thurs-

rates from Woodstock, Ingersoll and St.
Thomas.

—The lease of the L. and P. S. R. to the
L. E. and D. R. R. was finally ratified at a
meeting of the board yesterday afternoon.

—The present Mayor Eszery, Ald.
Parnell, Judge Shaw, James Fitzgerald and
Deane and Mr. F. Leonard.

—St. Thomas Times: A number of per-
sons from this city are desirous of going
over to London on Thursday night, when
the London Liberals present "The Midway"
in the Princess Avenue Rink, if train ar-
rangements can be made with the M. C. R.

—Security for the costs in the celebrated
betting case appeal to the Supreme Court
has been given. The bet was between F.
T. Treblecock and J. Richards for \$500.
The costs now amount to \$3,500. The
Carling men have been beaten three times,
but will try again.

—At the classic chamber concert of the
Haydn String Quartet in Victoria Hall to-
morrow evening will be given Mendelssohn's
Minor piano trio, with other compositions
of the great masters. Miss Gammage, of
Chatham, soprano, and Mr. Bert Stock-
well, of this city, are the vocalists.

—The St. Thomas Hockey Club will visit
London on Friday and play a match in the
Princess Rink in the evening. Judging
from the manner in which the home team
defeated Petrolia on Monday night, London
may be put to the expense of shipping
a case of goose-eggs to the Railroad City.
The home team will practice to-night at 6
o'clock.

—Rev. R. W. Ross, M.A., was ordained
and inducted into the pastorate of the
Presbyterian Church, Glenora, on Monday
afternoon. Rev. A. Henderson presided,
Rev. Mr. Miller preached, Rev. J. A.
Murray, of London, addressed the minister,
and Rev. J. A. MacDonald, of St. Thomas,
addressed the people.

—The Women's Missionary Society in

the ground for the action is that it has
created a great deal of sickness in his

Fancy Skating.

The attendance at the Princess Rink last
night was the largest this season. Carnivals
were left in the shade, and this was ac-
counted for by the fact that an exhibition
of fancy skating was to be given by the
peerless J. D. Bruce. Bruce is a Canadian,
young in years and his home and birth-
place is Galt. He has been traveling
throughout Ontario during the winter
giving exhibitions at all the principal
cities and towns, in all of which he received
praising notices from the press. At his
performance here Bruce exceeded the
expectations of the large crowd which had
assembled. The programme consisted of
some very difficult feats, including the ex-
ecution of figure eights (single and double),
rolls and vines, in the accomplishment of
each of which he was heartily applauded.
The ease and grace with which Bruce ex-
ecuted his difficult gyrations was simply
surprising. In a combative work he also gave
some front and back hand-springs in a
manner which won hearty rounds of ap-
plause. He may be re-engaged to give
another exhibition at a future date, after
which he will leave for Minneapolis.

Funeral of an American-Canadian.

The funeral of the late Alexander
Mazyck, whose interesting career was
divided in residence between the United
States and Canada, took place yesterday
afternoon. Service was held in the Church
of St. John the Evangelist. At the door
the casket was met by the amplified choir,
which sang "Hush, Blessed Are the Dead,"
as it was being borne down the central
aisle to the altar. Rev. W. T. Hill, rector,
read the liturgy for such occasions. A
large number of former fellow-parishion-
ers were present to do honor to
the deceased, the greater number of
whom accompanied the cortege to
Woodland Cemetery, where the remains
were buried. The cortege was led beside
that of his brother, Mr. Edward Mazyck,
who, two years his senior, died about
thirteen years ago. Neither of the brothers
was ever married. An incident in the
biographical remarks previously pub-
lished in the ADVERTISER's columns—was
the prominent part he took as a member of
the South Carolina convention, which
passed the ordinance of secession, Dec. 20,
1860, just previous to the civil war. The
State, it will be remembered, was the first
to secede. Mr. Mazyck, being a Southern
planter, was a strong advocate of State
autonomy and the right of secession.

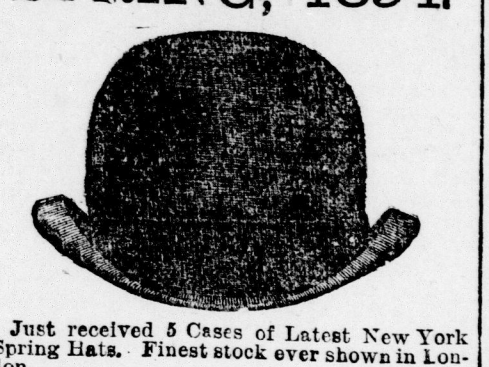
