

> Che Foo, Sept. 8.-4 p.m.-Apparently well-informed Japanese, who reached Che Foo from Port Dalny today reported that the Japanese army before Port Arthur is preparing to make another assault on the fortress. Japanese agents here are sending to Port Dalny 70,000 gunnysacks and are endeavoring to secure 60,000 more. It is reported that these sacks are to be filled with sand and used to fill up portions of the moat protecting the Russian right flank. The Chinese report that the Russians are paying 50 cents each for unexploded shells manufactured for use during the Chinese-Japanese war. The persistency of this report during the past two weeks entitles it to considerable consideration as indicating a shortage of large ammunition at Port Arthur.
