Washington, May 9 .- Pope Pius X.'s last encyclical letter to all the prelates and others in the Roman Catholic communion is considered one of the most important and far-reaching documents he has written since his elevation. The encyclical has just come to the apostolic delegation in the Latin form, and will soon be trans-

lated and sent throughout the country. According to the prelates, the enit speaks authoritatively on subjects which now are harassing the American secular as well as religious world. The Pope speaks in positive terms on the vital importance of moral teachings for young and old, and of the influence of religious instruction on nation as well as the individual. He makes a general review of the deporable condition of the world at the present time, and suggests that the remedy lies in knowing more clearly and following more docilely the teach-

ings of Christianity.
