Not To Be Dismantled by Home Government—Aylesworth and Cabinet.

Ottawa, Feb. 20. — When the motion to go into supply came up today, Col. Hughes inquired as to the taking over of the defenses of Halifax and Esquimaux by the Dominion Government. In reply the Minister of Militia said the negotiations were now under way for the transference of the garrisons from British to Canadian control. Col. Hughes concluded by saying that for himself he would like to see the Canadian Government assume the defense of such places as Gibraltar and Malta. Sir Frederick Borden said that in 1902 the Canadian Government was not able to accept the suggestions of the Imperial Government, as to the methods by which Canada would aid the defenses of the Empire, and the Government and people of Canada were desirous of relieving the British taxpayer as far as possible, and obviously the first way in which that could be done was to relieve the "mother country from expenditure on Canadian defenses."
