At the last meeting of the London Township council a petition was presented as follows: "To the municipal corporation of the township of London,

"Gentlemen,-We, the ratepayers of the township of London, whose signatures are hereto affixed, beg humbly to bring to the attention of your council the fact that the school building in section 22 is at the present time so erowded with pupils resident of the section, that the accommodations are not adequate within the requirments of the act. The present conditions will not be allowed to continue, and the trustees of the section have already been advised that a further addition will have to be made. In view of this and in view of the unreasonable long distance many of the children, whose parents are parties to this petition, have to travel to reach the present school site, we deem it a most appropriate time to press upon the council the necessity of making the division of the section."


