FRANCE TO ADOPT 2-POWER STANDARD

Mediterranean Fleet Is To Be Brought Up to That Limit at Once.

Paris, June 9. — The Matin's announcement that henceforth France will maintain a two-power standard for its Mediterranean fleet and also that if between now and 1914 Austria or Italy decides to increase its naval power the French minister of Marine will immediately ask Parliamentary credits to cover similar increases, is not denied even officially and hence is acceptable as accurate. The announcement has been followed by a discussion regarding the present and future comparative strengths in the Mediterranean. The Matin 1912 France will add eleven battleships and seven cruisers against Austria's and Italy's nine battleships and six cruisers. In the estimates for 1912 France will add eleven battleships and Austria and Italy ten.

KOREAN CHRISTIANS PLOTTED ASSASSINATION

Japanese Governor-General Says Conspirators Were Not Put to the Torture.

Seoul, June 8. — General Count Terauchi, Japanese governor-general of Korea, quietly visited Pyongyang yesterday, and met the foreign missionaries to whom he explained the Japanese Government's attitude on the Christian movement in Korea. Count Terauchi said that the stories concerning a conspiracy on the part of Korean Christians against his life were unquestionably true, but that the utmost leniency had been exercised toward those having connection with it. He gave the missionaries his personal assurances that there had been no torturing of prisoners. Count Terauchi said the Government executed the missionaries from any connection with the conspiracy against him, and told them that he would cooperate with them in their movement. The missionaries in return expressed their deep satisfaction with the governor-general and their confidence in him.

NEW HEARING FOR THAW.

Matteawan, N. Y., June 8. — "I only want a ticket one way. Hope I will not need the return part," said Harry K. Thaw, today when he started for White Plains, where his attorneys are about to make another effort to free him from confinement here in the State Hospital for Criminal Insane. Pursuant to a supreme court order Thaw's residence during the trial of his suit will be the White Plains jail. He seemed in excellent spirits this morning. One of the hospital attendants accompanied him.

EXCESS OF MOISTURE THROUGHOUT ONTARIO

Prospective Yield of Grain Reduced by Flooded Land.

Toronto, June 8. — The Weekly Star, devoted to the interests of farmers, today says:

Ontario, which suffered so severely from drought last year, is threatened with corresponding loss this season, owing to excess of moisture. Grain seeding, which should have been finished the first week in May, is not yet complete. Corn and mangel planting is also being held back. Land on which grain was sown has been flooded and prospective yields therefrom greatly reduced.

While the general crop situation is causing alarm, the advance of rain has produced a profusion of pasture and assured a good hay crop and the fruit outlook, with the possible exception of peaches, is promising.

THE LAW'S LONG ARM

Belgian Merchant Who Defrauded, Caught in Canadian West.

Ottawa, June 8. — The long arm of the law has reached out after Joseph Charles Verbeke, a Belgian merchant, who came to Canada some months ago and settled on a farm near West. On the information of the Dominion police here Verbeke was arrested by the provincial police of British Columbia. He was brought before a court of extradition at Nelson, B. C., and was remanded till the 13th, according to information wired Dominion police headquarters here today.

Joseph Charles Verbeke, according to information regarding him received from the Belgian authorities, was a merchant at St. Nicholas, and came to Canada, settling with his wife and family on a farm in the West. If extradition is ordered he will have to leave his home and return to Belgium to put in a term of four years and three months in prison.

On January 24 he was declared bankrupt by the court of St. Nicholas. He was sentenced to four years and three months on the latter charge.

A LONG DIG.

Niagara Falls, N. Y., June 8. — It took a policeman and three men to stop Tony Volito from working last night. He was employed with an excavation gang and for hours after the others stopped work he kept swinging his pick. He said he was digging his way through to Turkey to get at Italy's enemies. He will be held until doctors examine him.

And the Rest Will Take Charges In the London Conference.

St. Thomas, June 9. — Nine young men were ordained to the work of the Methodist ministry at the First Church here this morning. With the exception of one who is going to Japan, they are all under appointment in the London Conference. The ordination sermon was preached by Rev. Dr. Brown, general superintendent of the Methodist Church, who urged them to take their work seriously and emphasized the responsibility resting not only upon them, but also upon the laity.

The assisting clergymen were: Rev. Dr. Dougall, of St. Thomas; Rev. J. E. Ford, Rev. Joseph Philip, of Essex; Rev. G. W. H. McAllister, of Elmhurst; Rev. R. G. Harris, of Piquette. After the laying on of hands the ministers were given Bibles, signed by the president and secretary of the conference. They received the communion tonight at the conference. Sacramental services, conducted by Rev. Alfred Brown, formerly pastor of the First Methodist Church. The preacher was Rev. N. E. Bowles, of China.

After attending a reception at Alma College the delegates attended a meeting of the Historical Society.

Rev. Walter Rigby gave an address on Indian missions.

Saturday afternoon was given up to a reception at Alma College, where the ministers enjoyed the opportunity of meeting Rev. Dr. Warner and his staff. The laymen held a meeting in Grace Church, where J. C. Hay made a strong plea for better support of the superannuated fund. He pointed out that although the salary of ministers have remained the same, and deplored the fact that a great like the Methodist Church allowed them there had worn themselves out in its service to want for the necessities of life.

ESCAPES FROM CZAR; COMING TO CANADA

Makes Way to London After 10 Years in Siberian Prison.

Toronto, June 9. — Through the agency of a newspaper, William Schkolnik, a Russian, living at Trenton, has obtained a clue to the whereabouts of his sister, who recently escaped from a Siberian prison after being confined there for ten years. Schkolnik, who is known in Trenton as Suckloss, an Anglized version of his name, came to Canada with two brothers when their sister was arrested for belonging to a terrorist society and sentenced to spend the rest of her life at Maltchiesky Prison, several weeks' journey south of Irkutsk and not far from the Chinese frontier. He learned that the unfortunate young woman, now only 27 years of age, had succeeded in making her escape, and heard that she was at an address in Paris, France.

He came to Toronto and through Louis Goussinsky arranged with the Allan Steamship Company to send transportation and money for her journey to Canada. The agents of the steamship company failed to cover her at the place named and the disappointed brother on Saturday last was overjoyed to read the tale of her terrible experiences and escape in an article in a local newspaper.

This article spoke of her as being at a house in London, England, known as the headquarters in that city of the Russian Terrorists. Schkolnik will be enabled to communicate with his sister and bring her soon to this country.

MONTREAL FEELING EFFECTS OF STRIKE

Steamers Tied Up at London That Should Be in Canada.

Montreal, June 8. — Should it last much longer, the London docks strike will seriously interfere with the St. Lawrence trade. Already the C. P. R. and Allan lines have seven steamers between them, the movements of which are being hampered by the strike. The former company have the Montreal, Montezuma and Mount Royal in port at the present time, with the Mountfort arriving to share the berth.

The Allan Line have the Scotian, Ionian and Corinthian, and all these steamers are tied up and no work being done on them when they should be busily loading for this side.

RUN OVER BY AUTO.

Toronto, June 8. — John Wilson, aged 15, a messenger boy employed by the Canadian Bank of Commerce, was run over by an automobile at Yonge and Adelaide streets at 9:15 o'clock this morning, while riding a bicycle, sustaining internal injuries. He will recover.

ONE DAY'S REST IN SEVEN

Berlin Physicians Say Their Duty Calls for Sunday Off.

Berlin, June 9. — The Berlin physicians have declared for one day of rest in seven. The movement was started by physicians who declare that arduous work and long hours have broken their sleep. They say their duties call for Sunday rest much more than in other professions. It is proposed to divide the city into districts, with one or two physicians selected in rotation to take care of the practice of all other physicians in that district.
