

The nomas Shoe-Bags For Travel

Shoe-bags for travelling are made of many materials, but Canton flannel seems to be the most satisfactory. Half a dozen of these bags make a neat addition to the trunk. They are simply made. Take a strip of Canton flannel from six to eight inches wide two and two and one helf time trunk. They are druff and stops hair from falling in two weeks.
