#### LOOKING FOR LOAN OF HALF A BILLION

Anglo-French Commission Is Preparing for Great Task.

MISSION MAY BE WIDENED

Holders of American Securities Said To Be Loath to Let Them Go.

NEW YORK, Sept. 10.—The Anglo-French commission, seeking a way to meet the huge bill of Great Britain and France for American munitions and other supplies, reached New York today, was welcomed by J. P. Morgan and men, and approximately 100 prominent bankers, insurance heads and leaders in other lines of finance late this afternoon at a reception in Mr. Morgan's library. Tonight the commissioners were dinner guests of a party of New York financiers. Actual negotiations as to the credit they hope to establish here were not begun and will not be for several days. During this period the commission expects to meet many other bankers and exporters and to become familiar with the situation. With these preliminaries disposed of, the commission will start on the actual details of the proposed loan.

Significant Statement.  
For publication, the commission issued a statement upon its arrival here on the steamship Lapland. This statement detailed the personnel of the body and recited its purpose. It was assumed significant that in this statement reference was made to the commission as "the joint Anglo-French commission." This was taken as an indication that the credit which it hopes to establish here will be of a joint nature as previously reported unofficially.

Although the commission comes as the representative of the British and French Governments and holders of both nations, it seemed likely tonight that it might, before its departure, be called upon to adjust the whole foreign exchange situation for all the Entente powers. To the previous report that the delegation probably would act for Russia, there was added tonight the intimation, on good authority, that Italy might within a few days find it expedient to request the commission to act for its Government as well.

Italian Depreciation.  
Italian money depreciated in this market to a degree unequalled by any other. At the present time lire are worth approximately half three-quarters of their face value. Largely because of this, Italian exporters no longer, in many cases accept their own money in payment for goods shipped here, but insist upon being paid in dollars or sterling.

In the case of Italy, the depreciation of money values here has resulted in a situation which financiers here feared, might be paralleled with respect to France, Great Britain and Russia should the exchange rates on their money drop much lower than the lowest levels have recently touched. Chiefly because of depreciation, Italy some time ago cancelled orders for millions of bushels of American wheat and sent her buyers to Argentina for the grain, which otherwise would have been purchased here.

Great Britain and France, it was said, might be tempted to contemplate the possibility of having to go to South America for grain and meats to an extent much greater than at present, and of turning to Egypt for their cotton. Munitions of war they must buy in the United States because there is no other market; but these, it was said, form only a minor fraction of the total exports and can be paid for in gold for a long time to come.

Heavy Reduction Planned.  
From an authoritative source it was learned tonight that not only had Great Britain and France contemplated a heavy reduction in their purchases here, but in every line, except necessities which they cannot buy elsewhere—but that it had been decided that such a reduction would be suggested by a suitable port, should the commission fail in its mission to the United States.

Five hundred million dollars is the smallest sum which the commission hopes to borrow. They could much rather have a round billion. In view, however, of the many difficulties which lie in the way of floating a credit loan of such proportions in America, it was thought that the commission's task would be almost of Herculean proportions in borrowing the smaller sum. The entire proceeds, of course, would be used in paying for American supplies.

Chief of the obstacles which the commission faces is the nature of the collateral. It is regarded as almost imperative that American securities be offered as collateral if the loan is to be financed largely by the national banks, as it would have to be, if of the proportions indicated. So far, it was said, the holders of American securities abroad have evinced a strong tendency to cling to their holdings and the best investment in the world today. Nothing approaching half a billion dollars of American securities as the command of the British and French Governments, it is said, although citizens of those countries have eight to ten times that amount of such securities in their vaults.

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Commenting on what it terms the difficulty of understanding the American attitude, which resulted in the first definite step taken being to punish a breach of diplomatic etiquette instead of exacting reparation for the loss of American lives, the Times says "it is willing to believe some governing principle exists, although it may not be apparent to British observers, and that President Wilson, having taken his stand, is not the man to be put off with any false excuses."

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#### GERMAN-AMERICAN CRISIS NEAR AGAIN

Perfidy of Teutons Once More Makes Break Not Unlikely.

NEW OFFICIALS INVOLVED

Submarine Question Unsettled and Berlin's Reply Thought Unsatisfactory.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.—President Wilson's request for the recall of the Austrian ambassador, Dr. Constantin Theodor Dumba, has broadened into a situation involving Capt. Franz Von Popen, the military attaché of the German embassy; Alexander Nuber von Perked, the Austrian consul-general in New York; and possibly Count Von Bernstorff, the German ambassador. The official view is that the ambassador, although technically involved, is not so seriously concerned as the military attaché or the consul-general. It is not unlikely that both of the latter may be recalled or dismissed from the country.

Coupled with Germany's disappointing and unsatisfactory explanation of the sinking of the White Star liner Arabic, after Count Von Bernstorff had given assurances that full satisfaction would be given if it was established that a German submarine sank the ship, official Washington views the friendly relations with the Germanic powers strained more toward the breaking point than ever before.

Crisis Not Past.  
Hope that the submarine crisis has been safely passed and that a break between Germany and the United States has been avoided, were displaced today by misgivings. The possibility of breaking diplomatic relations was heard again, although this time it involved both the central powers, on the one hand, and Austria, after having her ambassador practically dismissed from the country, might stand with her ally in relations with the United States.

Non-official reports that second notes had been started from the Berlin foreign office for Washington furnished the only basis of optimism in official quarters. So far as the submarine controversy was concerned, there was no official intimation that another communication was on the way, but the American note on the Arabic probably will be delayed until officials can learn whether to expect anything additional from Berlin.

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
