81 PER CENT SUCCESSFUL IN RECENT HIGH SCHOOL ENTRANCE EXAMINATIONS

London Pupils Take High Standing in Annual Tests, Results of Which Are Announced Today—Robb Medal Goes to Girl Student at Lorne Avenue School.

Miss Blanche McKenzie, a pupil of Lorne Avenue School, of which W. J. Shogrove is principal, was the winner of the Robb medal, taking the highest stand in the recent entrance examinations, among public school pupils.
Of the students who wrote 81 per cent were successful, a splendid showing. The marks of the unsuccessful candidates will be mailed to them at an early date.

Thirteen boys went to work on the farms of Middlesex County, and the certificates will be issued, as soon as the reports are received from their employers, showing that they have fulfilled their agreements.
Appeals by unsuccessful students must be made to the chairman of the high school board on or before August 29. If their appeal is rejected, by the payment of a fee of \$2 the papers will be re-read, and if successful, the student will have the money returned.
It is important that all appeals should be settled before September 8, the date on which the Collegiate Institute opens.

PATERNAL ADDRESS TO MEN IN KHAKI BY REV. J. MACNEILL
Famous Pastor Urges Soldiers To Enlist for Christ.
THE GLORY OF RELIGION
Evangelist Emphasizes Sure Foundation of Word and Power of Jesus.

"See what I'm handing you. I'm just talking to you as if you were my own two boys in front of me there. Johnny, who is in Vancouver. I still call him Johnny though he's a man now of perhaps 35. His name is the same as mine. John MacNeill. My birthday was on the 7th of July and his the next day. When he was back at home, I'd be getting a lot of cards on my birthday, addressed 'John MacNeill.' I took them on my own birthday and showed them along to Johnny the next day on his, and it did him. Same name, and it was a' the same. A perfectly good name and vera enormous. Well, Johnny has put on the khaki. Then there's Tommy, I've told you about him. We remember he's just 23 and had graduated the engineering in Glasgow and was just going to follow his mother and me to the States when the war broke out. He enlisted straight away. He's been in the trenches, twice wounded, and now he's on the munitions."

Soldiers Interested.
It would have been a hard-hearted soldier had indeed who could have resisted so fatherly a statement, and such an evidently fatherly attitude on the part of Rev. John MacNeill, as he stood last night on a little wooden platform placed beneath a tree and faced a large gathering of men of the 16th Battalion, who looked, grayed, sat and lay on their own camp ground to listen to the second address of the week delivered to them by the great Scottish evangelist.
Before he had progressed very far, backs began to straighten as interest was more and more awakened. Literally, as well as figuratively, the boys stood "tutting up" with the speaker. They couldn't help taking notice of a speaker who immediately established a family relationship with the soldiers, and to their common sense, their logic, their humor and their reason, played upon their heartstrings and had them laughing one moment and then next near to the many tears which cleanse the heart, and most important of all, offered them a sure foundation for faith and things that could not be shaken.

At Battle Front.
"When we get over there," he said, "and the air throbs and roars with the trenching and the earth is rocking and pounding, remember that here in London John MacNeill told you of the things that cannot be shaken. He told you that the things that cannot be shaken are the things we preach. They have been always true, they are true and will always be true, though there were no trenches, no front, no charges, no dangers of wounding and of death itself. The things of the Bible would still be true."

And "the things which cannot be shaken" which he offered included the word of God, Christ, the solid foundation, the solid rock on which to build, and a God all-wise and all-true, and all loving, a God who is also the Jesus who talked to the woman at the well in Samaria, a Saviour with nailprints in his hands and feet, a Christ who is human as man and as divine as God.
Glory of Religion.
"I'm not going to give you the life, death and the other world, on the word of Jesus," he announced. "The glory of our religion is that the Lord of all the world came from the other side and lived all his life and died our death. I have never found him wrong about anything on this side—did you? If I have never found Jesus wrong about anything, I can trust him for the other side."

Concerning the tendency of young people to scoff at the need of religion, he had this warning, "Old men don't turn infidels and skeptics. They might be mistaken, ye know. Like the man who claimed to be a Christian, but said he didn't believe in foreign missions. Said he believed in leaving the heathen in peace as they were, but here's a \$250 in case I might be mistaken? Ye know ye're better than that man. I've never found him wrong about anything on this side—did you? I've never found Jesus wrong about anything, I can trust him for the other side."

A Sure Foundation.
Not only a "sure foundation" was offered, but also the assurance of a tremendous change in an instant, through faith in a living person, founded and grounded on that person.
In regard to the prevalent idea that conversion is largely a matter of feeling and emotion, "It's an error," said the evangelist. "I'm an expert on it. I've been speaking upon it. If feelings don't alter our relations in other directions, why should they when it comes to salvation? We are not saved by feeling, but by trusting Jesus. Someone might say to me, 'Do you feel like a married man?' 'Well, I'd not be likely to think of it in that way. Even supposing I was not some day married, I've got my wife, 'Peggy, I don't feel related to you today.' It wouldn't alter the fact. I know in whom I have believed and have complete assurance in his power to save me. My work tonight is to lift up Jesus Christ and stamp Him on your soul."

Then he took leave of the soldiers to whom he had been privileged to talk of the things of eternity and which cannot be shaken, before they go overseas.
"I'm so glad you've enlisted," he said. "That's a great decision. I hope you will make another and a greater to enlist for the service of the Lord of Lords Himself, the God who cannot be shaken."

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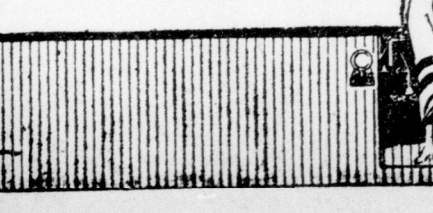
